BETTER PRICES NOW

RAISING HORSES ON THE UMATILLA RANGES.

Market Has Improved and \$2.50 Cayuses Are Not Longer Profitable.

The raising of horses on the ranges of Umatilla, Morrow and Grant counties is an industry that has improved wonderfully within the past three years. Prior to the Spanish-American war, the ranges were pretty well covered with horses of no great value. A large number of the animals were fit only for shipment to the Linton cannery in the Willamette valley, there to be slaughtered and canned for the market. A taste for canned horse meat has to be acquired and the American people have not been educated up or down to that point; consequently, the returns to a horseman from the sale of his horses did not show any big profit. Besides, the cheapest of cayuses only could be raised without actual loss for the canning market, and the ranges were becoming too valuable to raise that kind of stock. The thousands of head of cayuses shipped out, however, made room for better animals. Next above the cayuses came the horses suitable for cavalry, mounted infantry and in the artillery service in actual warfare. Of this latter class of animals the ranges were well supplied. Then the English-Boer war came on, and with it a demand for the very kind of horses that were to be found on the ranges above mentioned. Horsemen were enabled to sell off their surplus and make room for still better horses.

Mr. Millie's Views.

C. J. Millie, livestock agent for the O. R. & N. company, while in Pendleton recently, stated that the English demand for Oregon range horses for use in South Africa had been one of the most potent factors in clearing the ranges of undesirable stock and paving the way for a higher grade of horses. The horsemen, following in the footsteps of the sheepmen and cattlemen, are improving the quality of the animals raised, for the good of their own pocketbooks and for the benefit of Eastern Oregon as a whole. The tendency now is to raise better horses, in response to the demand. Prices justify such a course, and the ranges are too valuable for sheep and cattle to permit of them being used as a grazing ground by horses worth \$2.50 each for canning. Now comes a demand for still better horses. An inspector of the United States army will be in Pendleton on Tuesday, January 14, for the purpose of buying 252 head of geldings suitable for use in the artillery service of the United States. This will go far to clean up the ranges of that particular class of animals and make room for more. Horsemen are finding out that it costs but little more to raise an animal worth \$60 than one worth only \$20, and of course are governing their actions accordingly. In 1894-5-6 horses were a drug in the markets. Today they are worth the spot cash, and the demand continues firm, with an upward tendency.

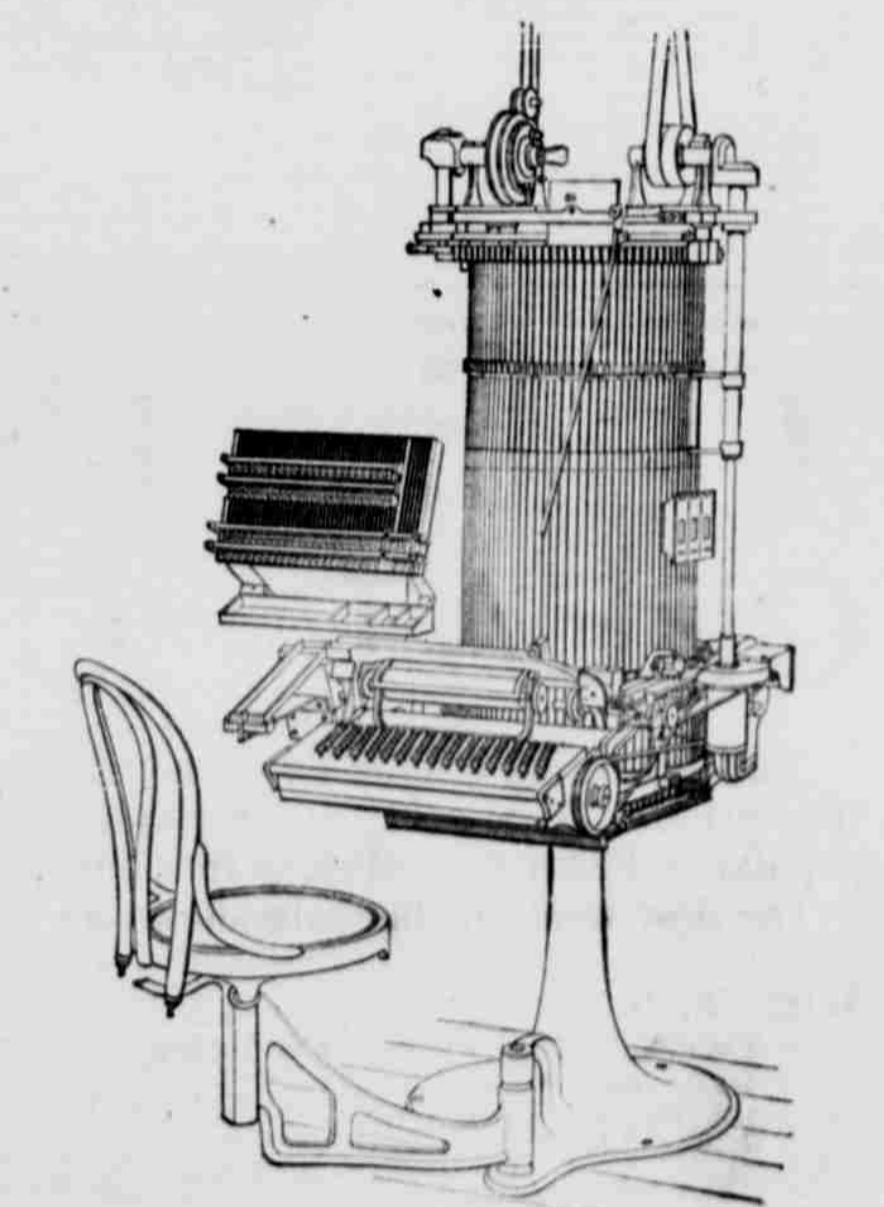
