# WHAT WILL OCCUR?

## THE COUNCIL MEETING TAKES PLACE TONIGHT.

Situation Remains Much as it Was, With Demands for Compromise Being Heard From the Citizens.

The matter of the marshalship and the recordership, the situation appears to be much as it was, with general inclination on the part of the citizens to ask that the question be settled soon in some manner to end all the excitement. No plan has been formulated, whereby the issue could be laid before the people in a manner satisfactory to both parties to the controversy. But numbers of citizens are beginning to say that the time has come when no longer should the city be stirred up and ill feeling engendered.

Will Lane is out of the question as a marshal, being a non-resident. L. G. Frazier refuses to accept the office of recorder. John Heathman continues to serve as marshal, and John E. Beam as recorder, and will do so until some successors are elected.

The injunction suits have not been heard, and it is not known when they will come up for a hearing. Many reports are on the streets of a sensational nature, but most of them are unworthy of publication, and are proven to be unreliable when run down as to the facts.

There is nothing new at this time, excepting an immense amount of discussion, and all sorts of plans for an ending of the troubles. Something is likely to happen at any time upon a moment's notice, and what that something will be, if it occurs, only one with divine prophetic knowledge could venture to say. Mortals dare not predict what the day will bring forth, excepting that it is safe to say that there is a growing disposition on the part of the citizens to demand compromise.

The word "demand" is used advisedly, for the people generally are not disposed to have the town injured by the quarrels of a few men. It is "up to" the parties to the quarrel to end it soon.

## NOT DISCOURAGED YET OVER MARKET DAY.

Management Will Try Again on February 11.

Market day was almost a failure again yesterday. Those who have been managing this affair for the Commercial Association set Tuesday, January 14, as the date to try and revive an interest in the proposition of having a monthly market day in Pendleton, after trying it during the fall and then letting it drop for a few months because of the uncertain weather of the winter. They made special efforts to get the government board of horse buyers here, and advertised this fact, hoping to interest farmers and get them to bring in horses, but the effort seemed to be unappreciated and only two horses were brought in, and these seemed to be absolutely no interest among the farmers and stockmen in trying to get anything at all here for sale. The management, however, are not discouraged to the point of giving up the proposition entirely, and say they hope to make a permanent market day a success in Pendleton yet. The next date will be the 11th of February.

## ESTES-SHUTRUM.

First Wedding of the Year Occurred This Morning.

The first wedding of the year 1902 occurred this morning at 7:30 o'clock, when the Rev. F. L. Forbes solemnized the marriage of James H. Estes to Miss Iol Shtrum, at the home of the bride's mother, Mrs. George Shtrum, in this city.

The groom is the well-known and popular barber who has been employed with William Kraasig for the past year. The bride has grown from childhood in this vicinity. Her father was the late George Shtrum, who represented Umatilla county in the legislature a few years ago and was very prominent in republican politics of the county. The wedding was witnessed only by a few relatives and intimate friends.

## WHEAT MARKET OFF.

Quotations Are Less Than They Were a Few Days Ago.

The price of wheat in the local markets is off again, it being quoted today at from 50 to 51 cents per bushel, and local dealers are not wanting any at this price. Eastern markets are off almost 3 cents from the high point, and Liverpool markets are now on the downward tendency. Local dealers think it will go still lower, because the world's markets are very panicky, with no certainty of demand for the near future.

## FOR THE HOSPITAL.

Commercial Association Work for Closing Street.

A called meeting of the Commercial Association was held last evening, with Dr. Vincent in the chair, President Johnson being detained at home by sickness in the family. The mat-

ter of the closing of Transit street, that the Sisters' hospital may use it, was taken up, and it was decided that the influence of the association be exerted in favor of it. The chairman was instructed to name a committee of two for each city ward, to secure signatures to a petition to the council for doing what the sisters desire, and which is necessary to the carrying out of their plans.

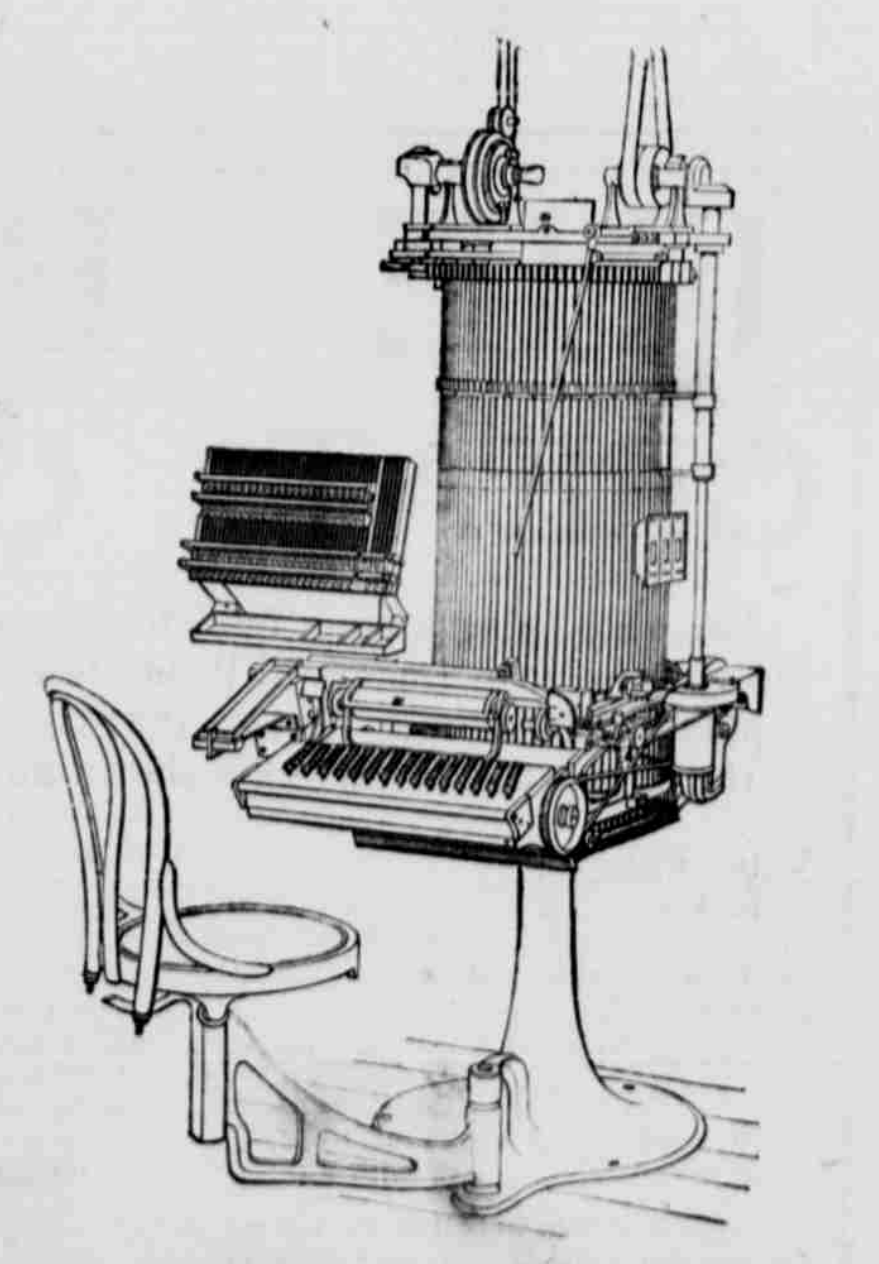
