LIVED AT UMATILLA.

Pioneer of Umatilla County who Died at The Dalles.

An old Umatilla county pioneer, Daniel Mead French, died at his home in The Dalles Sunday morning, January 12. He was born in Holland, Orleans county, Vermont, June 16, 1828. Leaving his native home in 1849, he spent two years in Danvers, Mass., going from there to Alexandria, Louisiana. In 1853 he came to California, being one of the 1400 persons blown ashore near San Diego on the steamer Golden Gate. In San Francisco he met his two brothers, Joseph and Joshua, where they engaged in business. Coming to The Dalles in the spring of 1862, he with his brother, Joseph, and G. B. Gilman, Joshua joining them shortly after, engaged in merchandising under the firm name of French & Gilman. In 1863, his brother, Marsh, came west and together they went into business at Umatilla. In 1865 he returned to The Dalles and purchasing Gilman's inter-

IS NON-POLITICAL

WALLA WALLA TAX-PAYERS HAVE FORMED A LEAGUE.

They Will See That Government is Economically Administered in That Part of the State.

Walla Walla, Jan. 15.—The recent agitation over extravagant public expenses has crystallized into a tax-payers' league which will in future endeavor to assist in an economical government in all branches of the public service, over which an influence can be exerted. The league will hold a regular meeting, the first next Saturday. The officers chosen at a meeting called to perfect an organization are: President, Milton Evans; vice-president, C. Newcomb; treasurer, S. C. Wingard; secretary, Frank Nalder; executive committee, Milton Evans, J. W. Herbert, C. D. Wilson, W. S. Gilliam, C. Newcomb.

The objects of the league are set out clearly in the constitution adopted, as follows:

"First—To unite of all tax-payers in one potential non-political center of force for the purpose of promoting the general welfare of this city and community.

"Second—To place county and municipal administration on a purely business basis.

"Third—To maintain and enforce the law, and to reduce the expenses of our city and county administration to the lowest cost consistent with good government.

"Fourth—To protect in every lawful way the rights of the people of this city and county.

"Fifth—To suggest and endeavor to have adopted new laws or amendments to existing laws where experience demonstrates the necessity for such change."

The by-laws of the league are modeled after those of the league at Portland, Or. It is asserted by the officers that an active interest will be taken in all local affairs of government.

HELIX TROUBLE SETTLED.

School Matter Adjusted and All is Peace in That Burg.

County School Superintendent J. F. Nowlin returned this afternoon on the W. & C. R. train from Helix, where he had been to look into the late unpleasantness in the public schools. The matter has been amicably settled by the school board meeting and exonerating Principal Mayberry from all blame of the trouble and reinstating him as principal. Since there has been so much unpleasantness, Mr. Mayberry thought he did not care to continue in the school and immediately tendered his resignation. Elias Pinkerton, of Milton, was hired by the board to succeed him.

Superintendent Nowlin stated that all seemed to be pleased with the way the matter has been settled and expressed the belief that there would be no more trouble.

WHAT TUTUILLA FARMERS HAVE BEEN DOING.

Letter Regarding the Producing Interests of That Locality.

Tutuilla, Jan. 15.—Deputy Sheriff Turner was a Tutuilla visitor on Thursday.

Frank Roach, Jr., is suffering from an attack of pneumonia.

William Howard formerly for a number of years a resident of Tutuilla, was over from the Grande Ronde valley last week, where he is manager of C. B. Wade's stock farm.

Frank Wall's team had a runaway and general mix-up on Thursday, in the course of which one horse had his foot nearly taken off. Dr. Christie was summoned from Pendleton and relieved the sufferer.

Charles Baker is hauling hay from Athena for the Pendleton market, making a trip in two days and hauling five and a half tons to the trip.

Pearl Howman is the proprietor of a hog ranch at Tutuilla on which 309 hogs in various stages of porkerdom are getting ready for market. He has also his own packing house, where the porkers are turned into bacon and lard, and although the quantity of goods turned out may not rival Armour's, the quality does.

J. Clove and William Rigby are working on a new model of a combined harvester, which they expect to have in operation next harvest. These gentlemen expect to demonstrate that 20 acres a day can be cut by a machine operated by 12 horses and two men. If they succeed, cheaper methods of harvesting will have been made.

J. E. Huff, who feeds cattle on Butter creek, was up from that locality last week. One hundred and ninety-three head out of the drove of 300 that Mr. Huff has been feeding, were sold last week to Frye & Bruhn, of Seattle, for 4 1/2 cents per pound, their average weight being 1400 pounds. These cattle were purchased prior to feeding for three cents a pound and weighed 1600 pounds. Seven hundred tons of alfalfa hay has been fed to the band of 300 to do the fattening. This seems to be a very profitable way to sell alfalfa hay, and as the land on Butter creek averages about six tons to the acre each season, the raising of it to feed cattle is a very profitable industry.

From a recent dispatch from North Tutuilla it is learned with regret that the population of that suburb has become so turbulent that the council after a somewhat protracted session of prayerful consideration and spirit-

ual meditation, were moved to increase the police force by a deputy marshal.

William Gusseman came up from Barnhart today, where he has been working with Marshall & Furnish's well boring machine. The machine has ceased operations for the present owing to a scarcity of gasoline.

R. E. Porter, who is down from Meacham today, says this is the best year in the history of Meacham for getting out wood. There has only been four inches of snow once this winter, and there is not the slightest danger of a wood famine. Allen Brothers and Hurt Blair had 300 and 160 cords respectively, burned recently.

Red Oak at St. Louis Fair.
