Daniel Mead French, died at his home in The Dalles Sunday morning, January 12. He was born in Holland. Vermont. June 16, Orleans county. Red Oak at St. Louis Fair.

One of the proposed features of the St. Louis fair is a removal of a large red oak tree from the wildest section Arkansas to Forest Grove Park. St. Louis without injuring it.
