THE MEDICOS PERFECTED THEIR ORGANIZATION
Have a Charter Membership of 52—Some Valuable Papers Read.
At 4:30 yesterday the Eastern Oregon District Medical Society, embracing the whole of Eastern Oregon, had finished the business they had met to transact and adjourned until their next meeting, which is to be held at Hot Lake on the 16th of July.
Twenty-four physicians were in attendance and they had a very profitable meeting. This was the first meeting of the society since it was organized and they have made it a permanent organization and closed the charter with a membership of 51.
In addition to the report of the meeting published in the East Oregonian yesterday, two papers were read, one by Dr. McDaniel, of Baker City, on the subject of "Osteomyelitis Necrotizing Hip Joint Amputation," and one by Dr. Cole, of Pendleton, on the subject of "Caesarean Section," which were both pronounced extraordinarily good by all who heard them. These papers and discussions on various questions for the good of the medical profession in general, for which purpose the organization was perfected, and the appointment of committees, took up the rest of the afternoon. The executive committee are: Dr. McDaniel, Baker City; Dr. Didebrandt, Milton; Dr. Hall, La Grande; Dr. Ferguson, The Dalles; Dr. Best, Weston. The board of censors are: Dr. Molter, La Grande; Dr. Curry, Baker City; Dr. McFall, Pendleton.
W. H. Lucas, president of the Northwest Baseball League, arrived at home in Portland from St. Paul, having stopped at Butte, Helena, Spokane and the Sound cities. Mr. Lucas has made satisfactory transportation rates with the Northern Pacific Railway Company, and he is very enthusiastic over the prospects for a successful baseball season in the Northwest.

WHAT THE LAW SAYS DEFENDANTS WANT

SOME OF THE OREGON STATUTORY PROVISIONS.

Sections Copied Verbatim From Hill's Code of Annotated Laws.

From among the many statutes of Oregon as they are found in Hill's Code, of which a volume is found in every lawyer's office, are taken these:

Using Public Funds.

Section 1772, Hill's Code, Annotated Laws of Oregon—If any person shall receive any money whatever for this state, or for any county, town or other municipal or public corporation therein, or shall have in his possession any money whatever belonging to such state, county, town or corporation, or in which such state, county, town or corporation has an interest, and shall in any way convert to his own use any portion thereof, or shall loan, with or without interest, any portion thereof, as by law directed and required, or when lawfully demanded to do so, such person shall be punished by imprisonment in the penitentiary not less than one nor more than 15 years, and by fine equal to twice the amount so converted, loaned, or neglected, or refused to be paid as the case may be.

Giving Money to Officers.

Section 1828, Hill's Code—If any person shall corruptly give, offer or promise to give, any gift, gratuity, valuable consideration, or thing whatever, or shall corruptly promise to do or cause to be done any act beneficial to any judicial, legislative or executive officer, with intent to influence the vote, opinion, decision, judgment, or other official conduct of such officer, in any matter, question, duty, cause or proceeding, which then is or by law may come or be brought before such officer, or with intent to influence such officer to act in his official capacity, in a particular manner, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by imprisonment in the penitentiary not less than two nor more than 10 years.

Accepting Money.

Section 1829, Hill's Code—If any judicial, legislative or executive officer shall corruptly accept or receive any gift, gratuity, valuable consideration, or thing whatever, or promise thereof, or any promise to do or cause to be done any act beneficial to such officer, with the understanding or agreement, express or implied, that such officer will give his vote, opinion, or judgment in a particular manner in any matter or question, duty, cause or proceeding which may by law come or be brought before such officer, or with the understanding or agreement that such an officer will in his official capacity act in a particular manner, or so as to produce or prevent any particular result, such officer, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by imprisonment in the penitentiary not less than five nor more than 15 years.

Consenting to Law Breaking.

Section 2011, Vol. 1, Hill's Code—All persons concerned in the commission of a crime, whether it be felony or misdemeanor, and whether they directly commit the act constituting the crime, or aid and abet in its commission, though not present, are principals and to be tried and punished as such.

Concealing and Aiding.

Section 2012, Vol. 1, Hill's Code—All persons who after the commission of any felony, conceal or aid the offender, with knowledge that he has committed a felony, and with intent that he may avoid or escape from arrest, trial, conviction or punishment, are accessories.

Oath of Office.

The following is the oath to which all officers swear:
State of Oregon, Umatilla County, City of Pendleton.

I, _____ do solemnly swear (that I am a freeholder in the city of Pendleton, and have been for six months prior to my election), that I will support the constitution of the United States and of the state of Oregon, and also the charter of the city of Pendleton and the ordinances thereof, and that I will faithfully perform the duties of _____ of the city of Pendleton, Umatilla county, state of Oregon, to which office I was duly and legally elected on the 2d day of December, 1901, for the term commencing January 1st, 1902, and ending the 31st day of December, 1903.

Subscribed and sworn to before me this _____ day of December, 1901.

The clause enclosed in parentheses is for councilmen and mayor.

FIRE BURNED RANCH HOUSE.

A. C. Henderson Suffers \$1000 Loss

Near Pilot Rock.

At the old Cottrell ranch near Pilot Rock, recently bought by A. C. Henderson & Sons, the ranch house was burned, entailing a loss to the Hendersons of not less than \$1000. The house was large, and the loss was total. Mr. Henderson and two men had been eating dinner, and had gone out to work on a fence, when at 1 o'clock the fire was discovered, but too late to extinguish the flames. The insurance was only \$400.

Suspended Mahoney.

San Francisco, Jan. 17.—Mayor Schmitz has suspended County Clerk Mahoney on account of pledges and appointments made before election in violation of the charter.

TO DISSOLVE THE INJUNCTION WRITS.

The Matter Came Before Judge Ellis This Afternoon, the Enjoined People Moving in the Premises, in the Circuit Court.

Motion to dissolve the injunctions issued against the mayor and four councilmen supporting him, was made by the defendants this afternoon, in the circuit court. The injunction was issued last Monday morning by Judge Hartman, of the county court, just a few minutes after midnight. The writs were returnable in the circuit court, and were sued out by John M. Heathman, marshal, and John E. Beam, recorder. Argument was postponed until Monday.

A general demurrer was filed by defendants, also specially demurring as to the jurisdiction of the court, and a motion to vacate the injunctions. Postponement was by mutual consent.

Decorations Conferred.

Berlin, Jan. 17.—Emperor William today invested more than a dozen dignitaries of state, diplomats and representatives of foreign royalties with the Order of the Black Eagle, the highest prize of German decorations. The investiture was accompanied with the usual impressive ceremonies. The event marked the opening of the January festivities, which concludes with the celebration of the kaiser's birthday anniversary ten days hence.

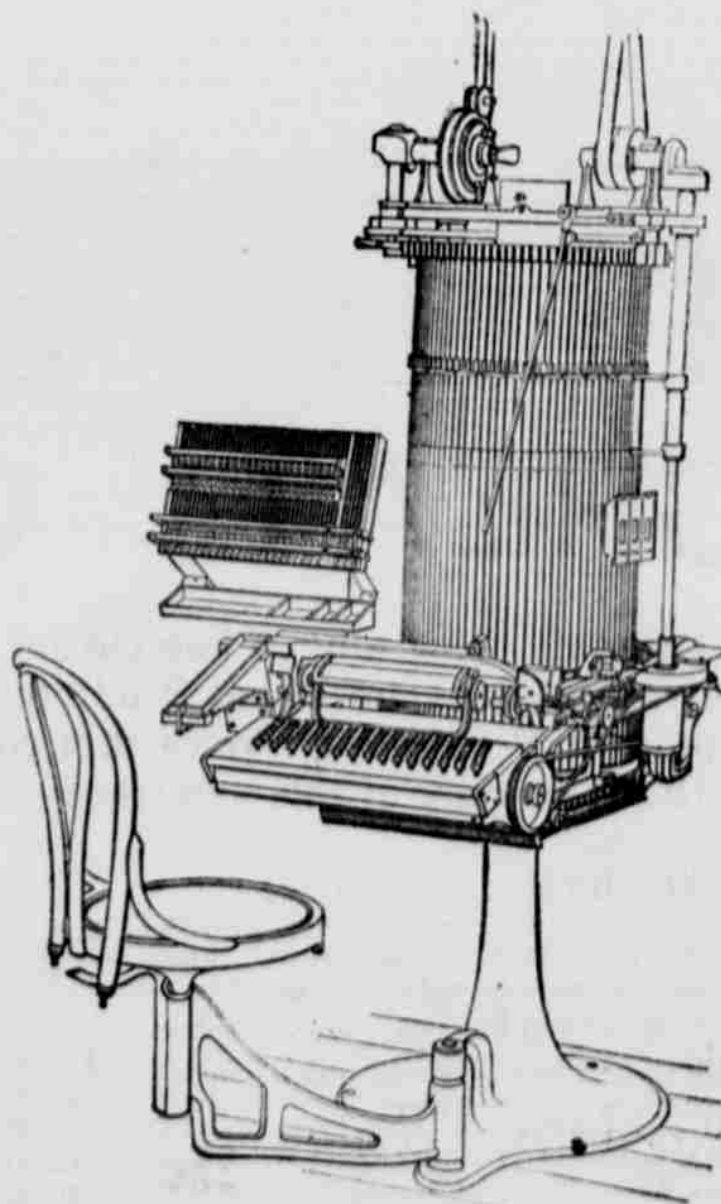
