The Thrilling Drama Depicting Russian-Siberian Life.

E. J. Carpenter's company produced the Russo-Siberian piece, "For Her Sake," at the Frazer on Thursday night, to a big house. It was presented fairly well with some weak spots in the cast. The play itself, however, staged as it was magnificently, atoned for all defects in the company, and made the engagement a brilliant one for Pendleton.
