

"FOR HER SAKE."

The Thrilling Drama Depicting Russian-Siberian Life.

E. J. Carpenter's company produced the Russo-Siberian piece, "For Her Sake," at the Frazer on Thursday night, to a big house. It was presented fairly well with some weak spots in the cast. The play itself, however, staged as it was magnificently, atoned for all defects in the company, and made the engagement a brilliant one for Pendleton. The staging was as good as that of any company that has appeared here. The rather small stage of the Frazer never before used to so good advantage, unless it was in the "Devil's Auction."

The conspicuous weakness in the cast was Ella Marble, who essayed the part of Princess Walanoff, mother of Prince Walanoff, the latter the hero. She was utterly unfitted for the character, which in the hands of a competent actor is strong. Several members of the company were suffering from colds and this detracted from the excellence of the presentation. Some of the dialogue was inaudible, and the audience was able only with difficulty to follow the thread of the story. Those who had witnessed the production at more competent hands perhaps noticed the defects more quickly than those who saw it for the first time.

Let it be said, however, that the company was conscientious, and did their best, and that is all that angels could do.

At the beginning of the action the Russian military authorities have disbursed a band of Polish patriots who have assembled to celebrate the last stand made by the people of that little country against the encroaching advancement of the Russians, who ultimately absorbed their territory and wiped them off the map of independent countries. There appears one of those nobles whose goodness of heart and inherent nobility of character appears to be bred of the despotic service which has fallen to their lot. Valdemar Radotsky is a prince of the blood, but with a heart that beats in unison with the present. In the struggle adverted to the prince saves the lives of several of the Poles, and it is in the performance of this act that he is

brought into contact with the persons whose career becomes interwoven with his, and which combines to form the web and web of the story of the persecution, plot and exile, interspersed with deeds of heroism on the one hand and acts of barbarous villainy on the other—and for acts of villainy the literature of Russia and Siberia furnish examples that have no peer in any other domain of history or of fiction.
