#### GENERAL NEWS

General Frederick Funston, who arrived home from Manila a few days ago on sick leave, will soon undergo another operation, according to Lieutenant Burton J. Mitchell, who made the trip across the Pacific with the general.

Orders were issued by General Miles involving an extensive movement of troops between the United States and the Philippines. Troops to the number of about 5233 stationed in the United States, are ordered to service in the division of the Philippines.

Although the Pacific transport service is not to be discontinued immediately, it is quite certain that within a reasonable time the government ships will be disposed of to private persons, and thereafter the carrying of men and supplies to and from the Philippines will be done under contract.

Secretary Root was heard on the question of the real lands in the Philippines before the house committee on insular affairs. He said these land holdings constituted one of the chief causes of discontent among the people; they were the hotbeds of insurrection and had furnished Aguirre his chief agent to commit crimes.

Professor Charles W. Pearson, of the chair of English literature in Northwestern University, which is conducted under Methodist auspices, has thrown a bomb into the ranks of atheism in Evanston, the seat of the university, by giving out for publication a statement of his belief that sinless infallibility is a superstition and that the biblical stories of Christ, bringing the dead to life and of his walking on the water and feeding the multitude with the loaves and fishes are mere poetic fancies, incredible and untrue.

#### PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS

Governor Geer received three contributions aggregating \$6.50, to the McKinney monument fund. Not many contributions have yet been received.

President Tozier, of Portland, says the National Editorial Association will cancel its convention at St. Louis if the exposition is postponed.

A Salem creamery operator has entered upon a new plan for the development of the dairy industry of the valley. Whenever he finds an industrious farmer who desires to purchase cows for a dairy herd, but who has not sufficient capital, the creamery man buys the necessary cows and then sells them to the farmer, taking a mortgage.

Governor Geer was asked whether Jack Wade's confession would make any difference in his attitude towards Dalton. The governor replied that he failed to see any reason why he should change his recently announced intention to let the murderers hang. "The law holds an accomplice equally guilty with the principal," he continued.

In the demeanor and conversation of Frank A. Rakowski, anarchist, degraded soldier and branded traitor, there is no tone of sincere repentance for the threats he made against the life of President Roosevelt and the approval he voiced of the assassin Crook. Pending the arrival of orders for his transportation to the military prison on Alcatraz Island in San Francisco Bay, Rakowski is confined in a cell in the guardhouse at Vancouver Barracks.

Sticklers for ethics in the dental profession, received a severe shock when they read the announcement published recently that Dr. William S. Wise, of Portland, one of the most prominent and progressive dentists in the state of Oregon, had decided to withdraw from the Oregon State Dental Society, and giving as his reason for pursuing this course, that the rules of that organization place obstacles in the path of progressive men, that have a tendency to dwarf ambition and make a mere drudge of the dentist.

#### REAL ESTATE AGENT WILL KNOW BETTER.

Won't Hang Out Any More Signs, "House for Rent."

A Pendleton real estate agent this week had an experience that taught him a lesson. He was quite convinced that this town is growing and that there are more people than can be comfortably accommodated in the houses now standing. But, this particular agent had this truth impressed upon his mind in a manner to make the impression permanent.

One day this week, he remarked to one of his clerks that he had listed a certain house for rent, and desired the young man to see that it was properly entered upon the books.

The young man did so, and then thought to earn the gratitude of his employer, by displaying a sign to this effect:

"Dwelling House to Rent."

He put out this sign and returned into the office, when he noticed a commotion in the street. People were rushing frantically towards the building in which this real estate agent had his office, and a moment later they began to crush up the stairs and start towards the door of the office. The young man thought he was about to be mobbed and quickly turned the key in the locking lock and thus arrested the progress of the apparently angry mass of people who were outside.

He seized a weapon that was in the room, and which his employer used to shoot people who dared to deny that Pendleton is the best town in the world, or in the solar system.

The end of the whole matter was that this indignant young man learned that he should not have hung out a sign of a house to rent in Pendleton, for the simple reason that there is such a demand for dwellings by the people coming here every day to locate that agents listing one of them retain the secret carefully, and let it out only upon the payment of a liberal bribe. This time, the sign was spotted by someone almost the instant it was hung out, and there was a rush that almost frightened the young man to death.

#### HEPPNER DOESN'T KNOW OF ROAD WORK BEGUN

People There were Surprised to Read that they had Accomplished a Coup d'etat on Pendleton.

A correspondent writing from Pendleton to the Spokesman-Review says:

"Heppner has begun the construction of a wagon road into the Susanville country. This move has been sprung with startling suddenness on Pendleton's business men. It is a coup d'etat. Pendleton has wanted the trade of the interior and the men of the interior wanted to come to Pendleton. Both sides thought there was enough in it for the other to start the road. While they waited Heppner stepped in and a gang is now at work at the Heppner end."

This correspondent is a good news-getter. If such a move is in progress it has been sprung with startling suddenness on Heppner business men also. There has been considerable talk about a road from Heppner to Ritter, but wind work has been the principal amount of work performed on the proposition. The East Oregonian, in a long article about the matter, says that it would cost \$75,000 to build this road, but the E. O. is about as far off on this as the Pendleton correspondent. \$2000 would build a fairly good road from Heppner to Ritter, and there is already a very good road from Ritter to Susanville and Ritter trade is divided up between Heppner and Pendleton, however, if this proposed road was completed, the people in these districts would rather come to Heppner on account of it being much closer.—Heppner Gazette.

It's Up to the Correspondent.

(The preceding from the Heppner Gazette is of interest. Apparently the Heppner newspaper people do not know as much about the road business of that town as the Spokesman-Review correspondent. Regarding the statement of the East Oregonian to which reference is made, the Ga-

zette misread apparently. What this paper said was that "no 90-mile road was to be built," and that the cost of a 90-mile new road would be several times what two or three miles of mountain road had already cost in the south end of this county, viz., \$12,000. As a matter of fact, it is well known here and has been known for some time that the Minors and a few others of Heppner own lands near McDuffie springs, and desire a wagon road to run from the present road between Heppner and Long Creek. That's the whole situation.

The Pendleton Commercial Association many weeks ago sought to get into communication with the Susanville people, and had appointed special committee for that purpose. When the matter has been adjusted as to the part of the enterprise to be taken here and there, all will be settled.

#### SIMON AND GEER.

Salem Paper Thinks a Headquarters Has Been Opened.

Simon and Geer. That is the combination. That is the way the thing is shaping up in Marion county, says the Salem Sentinel.

The combination has opened headquarters at Salem, in the Gray block, with E. M. Croisan in charge. Mr. Croisan, as has been known all the time, is a Simon man. It has also been equally well known that he was strictly anti-Geer; but since the above combination was effected it would appear as if Mr. Croisan's greatest devotion to Little Joe he had buried the hatchet of opposition to Geer, and swallowed the bitter pill that had been prepared for him. Be that as it may, it is certain that Mr. Croisan enters upon his work with only half a heart.

With the line-up on one side laboring for the advancement of Simon and Geer it looks very much at this writing as if the fight in Marion county would be fought out on clearly Simon-Geer combination and anti-combination lines, with every indication in favor of the ultimate and complete success of the anti's.

The fact is patent that it has been a full still is utterly impossible for the combination to inject the least enthusiasm into the ranks of the alliance. That the combination will have more substantial backing than anyone is evident from the early establishment of headquarters at Salem. However, with the right and public sentiment on the other side, such a combination organized without a heart in the work, no matter how elaborately the quarters (and halves) may be conducted, will prove but mild knees against the stone wall of an enthusiastic opposition.

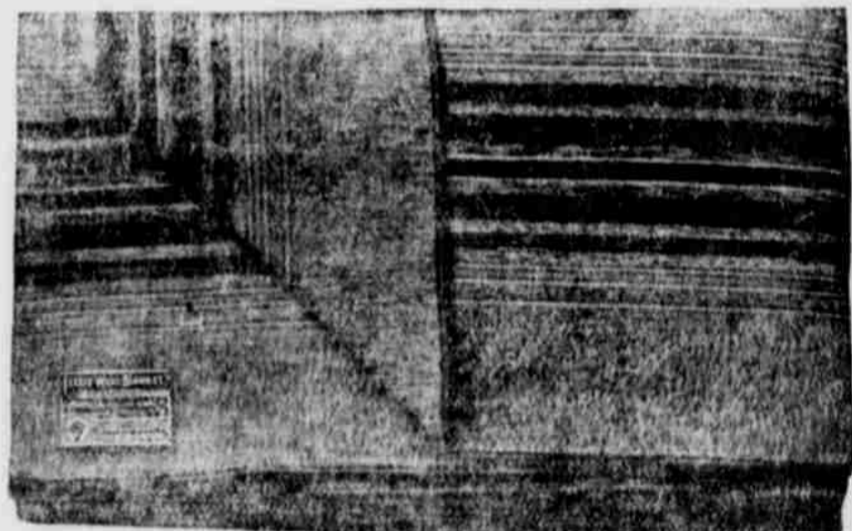
