POULTRY SHOW OPENS.

Garden City Exhibit of Blooded Fowls Begins Tomorrow. Walla Walla, Jan. 20.—Tomorrow, the third annual poultry show, will be thrown open to the public in Armory hall, with the best display of poultry ever seen in this city. The show will remain open for four days. W. F. Hitchcock, of Denver, a well-known judge, is in the city and will act as judge for the association, closing his labors Saturday. Several hundred entries have been made, and a few final entries will likely be made tomorrow. A number of pens of fine birds have been received from Oregon, Idaho, and points in Washington. A large attendance is expected, especially toward the close. Last year a Belgian hare exhibit was also given, but this time poultry is given all attention.
