A SOCIAL CLUB.**

Articles of Incorporation Filed With the County Clerk by the Hesses.

Articles of Incorporation of the Milton Commercial and Social Club were filed with the clerk of Umatilla county Saturday afternoon. The incorporators are Herman Hessel, Ernest Hessel and Charles Coker, and they are trustees with full power to transact any business of the corporation.

The purpose of this club, as set forth in the articles of incorporation is to promote the commercial and social interests of Milton, as well as develop the physical and mental capabilities of the young people of the town. A reading room will be maintained by the club, out and indoor sports, a library and literary work, beside rooms for gymnastics and all kinds of "muscle developing sports."

The corporation has no funds at present, but intends to maintain itself from revenues obtained from dues, fines and donations. It's life is to be perpetual and unlimited.

The Hesses are both saloon men and Coker is said to be a bartender. Rumor has it that this is the first move towards establishing a saloon in the temperance town of Milton.

IMPROVED SERVICE

**WALLA WALLA IS TO HAVE
UNDERGROUND WIRES.**

C. B. Hopkins, Manager. Tells People About Intended Improvements.

Walla Walla, Jan. 20.—Manager C. B. Hopkins, of the Inland Telephone Company, who has been in the city since Saturday, is making arrangements for expensive improvements in the service of the company in this city, representing a total investment of about \$50,000. A new building for the exchange and offices will be erected in the business center, work to begin as soon as the weather will permit and a suitable location can be secured. When this is done, some 20 blocks in the business center will be provided with underground wires, every one of the pole wires being taken down and placed in cables under the streets. In the residence districts no change will be made in the service.

The business has grown so rapidly in recent years that the telephone management has concluded to make the improvements and put an end to some of the troubles and expenses which have been common in the past. On account of the proximity of the telephone wires to the electric light wires in many places, crossed wires cause much annoyance and during storms the danger is quite great. And the horrible buzzing of the wires at times almost prevents the use of the telephone wires entirely. With the underground service the trouble will be entirely overcome, and the streets will be cleared of the hundreds of wires which now form a dangerous impediment in case of fire, as well as the other phases of the matter.

The telephone business has grown wonderfully in recent years. About 1000 instruments are in use in the city, while three years ago a small exchange was required and about 200 instruments were all the city could boast of. With the new arrangement the business will receive another wonderful development.

PIONEER CLERGYMAN DIED IN PORTLAND.

Rev. H. K. Hines, Best Known Northwest Minister.

Rev. Dr. H. K. Hines died at his residence at 2:45 o'clock Sunday morning, in Portland, of grip, rheumatism and complications. He was the father of the late Mrs. C. K. Cranston, of this city, and was quite well known here.

H. K. Hines, D. D., the youngest of 12 children of James and Betsey (Round) Hines, was born in Herkimer county, New York, in 1828. He was a brother of Gustavus Hines, a well-known Oregon missionary.

In his 19th year he was licensed to preach, and soon after, removing to Western New York, he was used as a supply on the Eden circuit, in the Genesee conference, on trial.

In December, 1852, he was transferred by Bishop Waugh to the Oregon conference, and the following summer crossed the plains with an ox team, reaching Portland October 30, 1853, to which charge he had been appointed by Bishop Ames at the first session of the Oregon annual conference.

As presiding elder he had charge of all the state of Washington, nearly all of Oregon and Idaho, and his travels over them made him more widely known personally, without doubt, than any other minister of the Pacific Northwest.

Dr. Hines was also professor of the theological department of the Portland University. His years of faithful work have been of great service and have been marked by ability, industry, constancy and efficiency. His capacity for hard work in both study and field supplemented his ability in the pulpit, and the promise of his early years was fulfilled. The wide field covered by his labors and the variety of the work to which he had been called, enabled him to an extent given to but few to impress himself for good on the civil and ecclesiastical affairs of the Empire of the Northwest.

COLD STOPS SWELLING.

Orchardists Think Lower Temperature Will Save Fruit From Damage.

The horticulturalists of this country have been set at ease, during the past few days, over the fear that the extraordinary warm weather was going to cause the fruit buds to swell and, then in case of a sudden cold snap, with the thermometer down to several degrees below zero, not only kill the fruit crop for the coming season, but damage the fruit trees to some extent. For the past several days the weather, while not cold, has been such as to check any growth that might have been started in any trees or vegetation, and the fruit trees, at least, have not budded enough yet to cause any alarm about them. For a week past the thermometer has ranged around the freezing point most of the time, with just enough cold at night to make the air brisk and freeze a very little ice where water could be left sitting in anything out doors. This condition is much more preferred to the fruit men at this time of year than warmer weather. The only thing lacking now is a good snow or more rain. Farmers are praying for more water

to wet the soil deeper, which is needed to insure good crops the coming year.

MINERS' NATIONAL MEET AT INDIANAPOLIS.

John Mitchell, President. Called to Order Today—Real Business Tomorrow Commences—Last Ten Days.

Indianapolis, Ind., Jan. 20.—Tomlinson Hall was filled to overflowing this morning when the annual convention of the United Mine Workers of America was called to order by President John Mitchell. Those in attendance represent the organized miners of Indiana, Illinois, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Kentucky, Tennessee, Michigan, Iowa, and a number of other states. Addresses of welcome and responses, the appointment of committees and other routine business occupied the opening session. The real business of the convention will commence tomorrow and the session will probably continue ten days.

Labor Bodies to Unite.

Washington, Jan. 20.—Much interest is manifested in the annual convention of the National Marine Engineers' Beneficial Association, which began its sessions here today, for the reason that it is believed action will be taken to form an amalgamation of the marine engineers and the longshoremen on the great lakes. Rumors of such a combine have been rife ever since the strike of the marine engineers last spring and it is said that the plans have now advanced to a stage where the union of the two organizations is a certainty.

Dayton, Wash., Jan. 20.—So far this season the firm of Stewart & Co. has shipped about 2000 tons of brewing barley to firms in four cities. All this cereal was produced in Columbia county, and is but a small part of the product of the hundreds of farms. A thousand tons of barley have been sent to Duluth, Minn., 300 tons to Springfield, New Mexico, 500 tons to Denver, and 150 tons to Wichita, Kan. These shipments have taken about 100 cars, each loaded with 20 tons, all being billed from this city.

**PETER WEST WITHDRAWS
OBJECTIONS COMPLETELY.**

No Further Reason Why Transit Street Cannot Be Closed for the Sisters' Hospital.

The subjoined communication from Peter West removes all objection to the closing of Transit street for the building of the hospital by the Sisters of St. Francis. The street is a short one running between the pieces of property owned by the sisters. It is desired to close it and permit the permanent use of it by the hospital. Mr. West had protested, and a special committee was appointed by the Commercial Association to circulate petitions to the council to be signed by the citizens. Mr. West's letter says:
