Portland Jan. 23.—The Commercial
Review:
While there is great activity along
the docks in loading the unusually
large number of grain vessels in port, it
is plain certainty that exporters
have provided cargoes for arrival ton-
nage. There is scarcely any new
business being done, either on spot
or in the interior. All markets have
ruled easier since our last review,
with more or less shrinkage in values
and manifestly less disposition shown
to operate. The English market,
which controls the course of our own,
has shown weakness and become ap-
athetic and quotations have been
marked down, with a poor inquiry at
the decline. We quote Walla Walla
club wheat, 63c; bluestem, 64c; valley,
62c per bushel.

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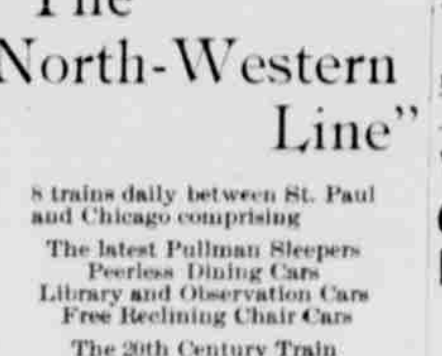
