REVENUE QUESTION

**HIGHER SALOON LICENSE
IS BEING DISCUSSED.**

Proposition is to Raise from \$350 to Something Like \$800, or Even \$1000.

Although there is nothing official in the premises, talk is heard upon the streets that the license in Pendleton may be raised from \$350 to a much higher figure. It is suggested that more revenue will have to be secured to replace that cut off by the stopping of gambling, and that the deficit promised from this source will be filled by making the saloon men pay more than they now are paying.

It is also said that the plan meets with the approval of some of the most prominent owners of saloons in this place, for the reason that it would tend to close up some of the weaker liquor stores, and give the stronger ones the monopoly. This, also argue some, would in turn reduce the number of saloons, and in part defeat the plan for the raising of more revenue. While those taking out licenses would pay more, there would be a less number of saloons to pay the higher license, and therefore the plan would be only partially successful.

"Higher license," said one man in talking of the matter, "would please many of the saloon men. It would give a fewer number the monopoly, and in the end benefit the owners of the places. It was for this reason that the gamblers were willing to pay the higher monthly fine that was to be imposed, as agreed upon at the caucus of the council and mayor before the present trouble arose, or at least the more prominent owners of games accepted the proposal for a higher fine with readiness. It would have given them a better show to keep out new gamblers, and to that extent work to their good. The doubling of the fine during the harvest season was for the same reason satisfactory. It would also have tended to keep out outside gamblers, and would have operated to the benefit of those now owning games here. If higher saloon licenses be proposed, I believe they will be agreed to by the heavier owners in Pendleton without a question."

42-YEAR OLD ELOPER

DUNCAN IS LOCATED.

Said to Have Been Found in Santa Rosa, Cal.—May Be Brought Back.

It is reported that Ezra H. Duncan, who eloped with Miss Ida James and left a wife and eight children in Weston, has been located in Santa Rosa, Cal., and will be brought back to stand trial as soon as extradition papers can be secured. The report is not confirmed, but it is thought to have some foundation.

On the 13th of December Duncan who is 42 years of age, left his home at Weston without telling his wife where he was going, and about the same time he was seen to board a train out of Walla Walla in company with the James girl, who is only 20. This she did. She went to Walla Walla and it is said that much of Duncan's time was spent in her company there. Seeks to Locate His People Formerly Living in This County.

"Will you please inform me whether or not you know of any person in your county by the name of Jordan. I am trying to find my mother or her people. From there he went to Iowa, where his folks lived. 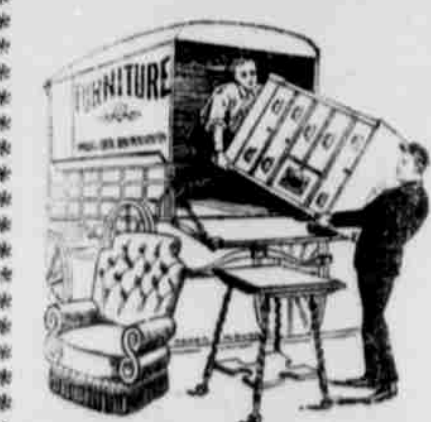
