Steps from Main Street Toward the Court House

DEAD IN HIS BED

JOHN LUHRS, PIONEER,
 PASSED AWAY LAST NIGHT

In the Evening He Was Apparently in
 Good Health — Discovered This
 Morning.

John Luhrs, a pioneer of this country,
 died some time during last night
 at the home of his wife's sister, Mrs.
 H. Stewart on West Court street.

Mr. Luhrs is an extensive sheep
 man, and came to town from his
 home, six miles east of Pilot Rock,
 Wednesday, to dispose of a part of his
 band. After spending the day in town
 he went to the home of Mrs. Stewart
 to remain over night and when he re-
 tired about 8 o'clock, was in his usu-
 al good health. Later, Winn Stewart
 went home and went to bed with his
 uncle. He was asleep when Winn
 went to bed, and he did not disturb
 him. This morning, when Mr. Stew-
 art went up stairs to awaken them
 for breakfast, Winn got up, but Mr.
 Luhrs did not move. Mr. Stewart
 took hold of him and shook him, but
 there was no response and he then
 made a closer examination, when the
 fact dawned upon him that Mr. Luhrs
 was dead. There had apparently been
 no struggle and he had only moved
 slightly from the position he was in
 when Winn went to bed with him.

This morning a doctor was sum-
 moned and he pronounced the cause
 of death apoplexy, and said that he
 had been dead apparently about six
 hours when the fact was discovered.

Mr. Luhrs was 70 years of age, born
 in Germany, and has lived in Oregon
 since the early '60s, he being one of
 the early settlers who helped to bear
 the hardships endured by the pioneers
 in opening up this country, and dis-
 covering its varied resources. He set-
 tled many years ago on the place
 where he resided up to the time of
 his taking off, where he leaves a wife
 and two sons, John and Glenn, beside
 a daughter, Mrs. Les Spicer, who
 lives with her husband on a farm
 near her father's place. They were
 notified by telephone this morning of
 the sad death and arrived here as
 soon as possible, when the body was
 taken to Pilot Rock for interment.

Mr. Luhrs was a very popular man
 and has figured in the political affairs
 of the county to some extent, having
 been county commissioner one term.
 He was nominated by the republican
 party and ran for sheriff of Clatsop
 county, against W. J. Garwood. It
 was at one office a member of the
 firm of Watson & Luhrs, owners of
 the Pendleton Plowing Mills.

CHICKENS FROM EAST.

Shipped in Ice Through Here to Spo-
 kane.

At the O. R. & N. freight yards to-
 day were seen 19 barrels of chickens
 packed in ice, shipped from Hastings,
 Neb., to Spokane. It was remarked
 by several who saw the shipment or
 learned of it that this is a sharp com-
 mentary upon the fact that the Pacific
 Coast needs to pay more attention to
 some of the industries that furnish
 foodstuffs to the people. Where could

 desired region.

C. A. Johns' Candidacy.

Notwithstanding the fact that the
 statement has been publicly made
 that Charles A. Johns was not a can-
 didate for the republican nomination
 for governor, Eastern Oregon men
 who are conversant with the peculiar
 condition of affairs in that section of
 the state say that Mr. Johns will
 make the race. His recent utterances
 on the subject give color to this be-
 lief. The statement has been made
 that Mr. Johns, considering the fact
 that he is a young man, is in doubt
 as to the expediency of waiting an-
 other 4 years for gubernatorial hon-
 ors, or of endeavoring to ride into the
 executive mansion on the crest of the
 wave of enthusiasm that the an-
 nouncement of his candidacy created
 in his home county and in other parts
 of the sagebrush country. It is said
 that the statements that have been
 made that Mr. Johns was brought out
 by astute politicians to further de-
 signs of their own and that he was
 not to be taken seriously, irritate that
 gentleman in no small way, and will
 probably cause him to formally an-
 nounce himself and remain in the
 fight until the last ditch is crossed.
 Eastern Oregon men say this is the
 view taken of it beyond the Cascades.

THE DRUM ON SHIPBOARD.

It Plays an Important Part in the
 Daily Routine of Duty.

"The Last of the Drums," is the title
 of an article written by Lieut. Con Mar-
 rick Perkins for St. Nicholas. Lieut.
 Perkins says:

In the navy as well as in the army
 the drum is hallowed and glorified by
 traditions of victory; and from the day
 Paul Jones ran up the first flag of our
 country, with its liberty-tree and its
 motto, "An Appeal to Heaven," down
 to the present, a man-of-war's drum-
 mer, though the smallest mite on board,
 has always played an important part
 in the daily routine of our nation's
 floating bulwarks.

From the rolling of "gun bright-
 work" in the morning, and the long-
 drawn, solemn beat to "quarters," to
 the last incident of the day—"taps," or
 "extinguish lights"—the drum retains
 its place here; and the little marine
 drummer, with his baby face and red
 coat, is the last to carry his drum proud-
 ly at the head of marching men and to
 blend its martial rattle with the blare
 of the trumpet, which has usurped the
 place of the fife.

These boys are enlisted at Washing-
 ton, and are taught in the music school
 at marine headquarters, after which
 they are drafted to the several marine
 stations at navy yards or distributed
 to vessels in commission all over the
 world.

They are enlisted at from 14 to 16
 years of age, and are bound over to

serve in the marine corps until 21,
 when they are honorably discharged.

While serving on man-of-war they
 swing in hammocks and mess with the
 marine guard, and in all respects are
 treated as if they are men; in action
 they serve at the great guns as powder-
 boys—"powder-monkeys" as they are
 sometimes called. The duty of a pow-
 der-boy is to pass charges from the
 magazine to the battery.

Drummers are distinguished from the
 private soldiers of the marine guard in
 full-dress uniform by a scarlet tunic
 with white facing and shoulder knots—
 the only dress in our service like the
 traditional red coat of "Tommy At-
 kins," the British soldier, which has
 been worn by the army for nearly 300
 years. As a joke upon this distinctive-
 ly un-American uniform, it is related
 that when the British were seen ap-
 proaching Bladensburg, during the
 war of 1812, a wag in the American
 ranks shouted: "Great Scott! boys,
 here comes the music. I guess I won't
 wait for the army!"

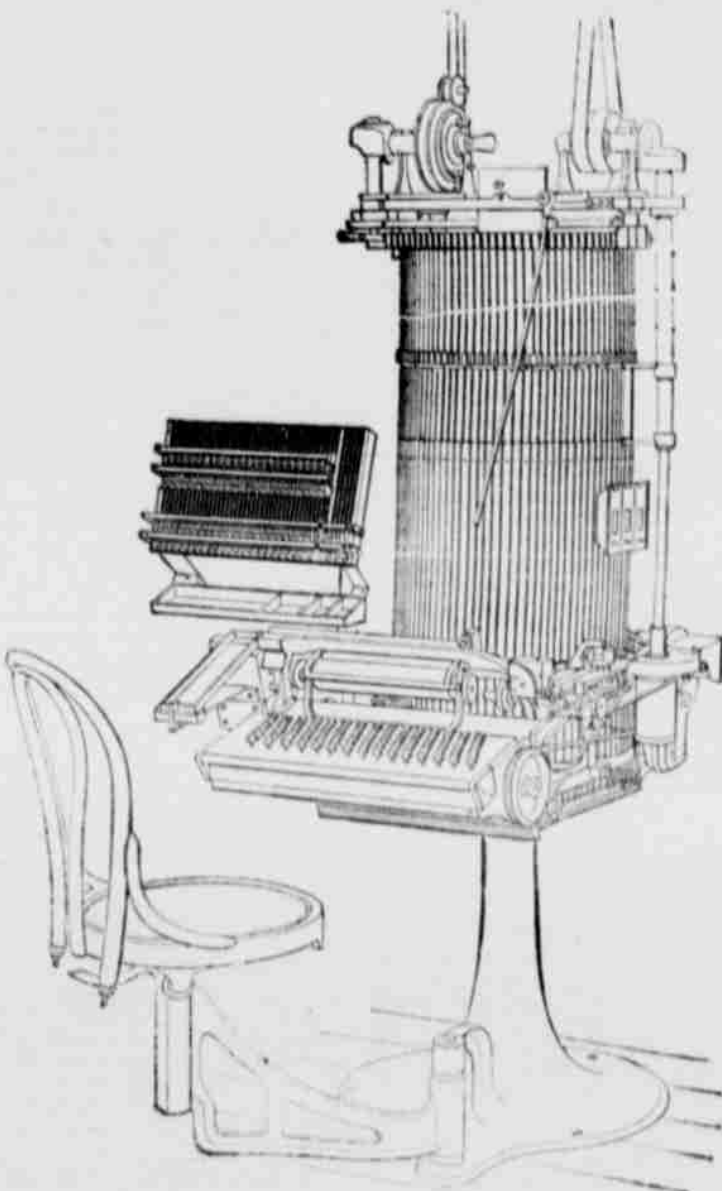
