

SEASON OF LENT

WHAT ROMAN CATHOLICS MUST OBSERVE FOR 40 DAYS.

Various Features of Abstinence Required by Communicants of That Church.

The Lenten season is almost here. It begins on Ash Wednesday, which is the 12th inst., and continues until Easter Sunday, which comes this year on the 30th of March.

Flesh meats can be partaken of at all meals on Sundays and once at a principal meal on all Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays and at all Saturdays except during "Ember Week," which falls on March 22.

The use of coffee, tea and chocolate is permitted at the morning meal as well as the midday meal, which is supposed to be the "principal meal" of the day.

Those not included in the above rules and are allowed to eat what they want are: The sick and feeble, Woman nursing children.

Those engaged in laborious and exhaustive occupations. Young people under the age of 21. Soldiers and seamen in the service of the United States are only asked to observe six fast days during the whole year.

In observing the Lenten season, people are asked not to partake of any intoxicating beverages or attend any public shows or places of amusement.

The Protestant Episcopal church communicants observe the Lenten season, but they are not so strict as the Catholics. It discourages the practice of attending any gaities or of its members participating in social or worldly pleasures.
