A PIONEER WOMAN

DEATH OF MRS. E. D. STILLMAN MONDAY NIGHT.

Had Been a Resident of This County for the Past Thirty Years.

Mrs. Mary A. Stillman, wife of E. D. Stillman, died at her home at the ton Academy, at 10 o'clock Monday night, after being ill less than a week, after being ill less than a week. One week ago today she was stricken with something similar to paralysis, but was better Wednesday. Thursday and Friday she began to grow worse, until Sunday, when she apparently went to sleep and never revived, sleeping until last night, when she breathed her last.

Mrs. Stillman was a widow when Mr. Stillman married her, having one daughter, Mrs. Elizabeth Chambers, whose home is in North Yakima, and who arrived on this afternoon's train, and three sons, one of them being William J. Brown, a prominent stockman, of Pilot Rock. The whereabouts of the other two boys is unknown. Since her marriage to Mr. Stillman, two sons have been born to them, Horace J. and A. D. Stillman, both of this city, who are left with the husband to mourn the loss of a kind and loving wife and mother.

Mrs. Stillman lacked only a few days of being 70 years of age, and has lived in this county since 1872, when she, with her husband, settled in Milton. In 1886 they moved to Pendleton and have resided here ever since.

The funeral will occur at 1:30 tomorrow at the family residence, and the body will be laid to rest in the Olney cemetery. She was a communicant of the Church of the Redeemer.

DEATH OF MRS. J. W. HILL.

Wife of Dr. Hill, of Portland—An Educated Woman.

Mrs. Jessie K. Hill, wife of Dr. J. W. Hill, of the Hill Military Academy, died Sunday in Portland, from heart failure.

The funeral was held from Trinity church at 1:30 p. m. today. The burial was in Riverview cemetery.

Mrs. Hill was a highly educated woman and much esteemed by her numerous friends. She was born in Westport, Conn., November 5, 1856, a daughter of Hon. George S. Adams. She finished her literary studies at Elmira, N. Y., and in 1878 was married to Dr. Joseph Wood Hill, who came to Portland the same year to take charge of the Bishop Scott Academy. For 23 years Dr. Hill was principal of the school and during that time his devoted wife assisted him, both in the work of the classroom and in making a pleasant home for the boys of the school. Deceased leaves two sons, Joseph A. Hill, now in his senior year at the Sheffield Scientific School, New Haven, Conn., and Benjamin W. Hill, a pupil at the Hill Military Academy.

SHIPMENTS OF LIVESTOCK.

175 Cattle and 2400 Sheep Go to the Sound.

Quite a good many cars of stock are being shipped out of this country to supply the Sound markets at the present time and at the rate they are going it will only be a short time until all the fat stock, including cattle and sheep will have been sold and buyers will have to look to some other quarter for their supply.

Monday evening J. Kennedy, who is buying for Frye & Bruhn, of Seattle, shipped five cars of cattle from the W. & C. R. stock yards and picked up two more at Athena, making seven cars in all.

Tonight, Wright & McCarty will ship seven cars of fat sheep over the same road to the Pacific Meat Company, at Tacoma, and Wednesday evening Kennedy will ship five more cars of sheep to Seattle.

This makes a total of 175 head of cattle in one day and 2400 sheep in three days.
