PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS

Gay in a dress of fresh paint, its hull moulded into form, Emperor William's yacht, the Meteor, is ready for the water at Shooter's Island.

Representative Tongue organized his irrigation committee and began consideration of the general irrigation bill recently framed by the special committee.

Everything points to a vigorous contest between the administration and the members of the republican party opposed to any reciprocity concessions with Cuba.

The republican members of the house held a caucus to consider a line of policy to be adopted concerning the alleged disfranchisement of voters in the South.

News of a most extensive campaign to assassinate the empress dowager of China and members of her court, and foment a widespread riot, which may result in the whole Chinese empire, was received by the steamer Cleopatra.

It is intended to be the purpose of the new government to make the census a proper coalition station, to be taken a condition of the underlying to hold an arbitrary signal. This is one of the factors that will be taken into consideration in making the final choice of routes.

Reports of damage caused by the wind and snow storms on the continent and in Great Britain continue to be received. Carriage and street traffic in Madrid has been stopped and railroad trains are delayed. Some of the towns in Northern Spain are isolated and fruit trees have been destroyed.

At Indianapolis, Ind., the operators have met the demands of the mine for an advance of 10 per cent with a proposition for a reduction of 10 per cent of the present wages. This is to line with the policy they urged last year at the joint conference at Columbus, which resulted in the agreement of 1900, made in this city, finally being annulled.

GENERAL NEWS.

Senator Mitchell has recently been urging the extension of free delivery service to Piedmont, Woodlawn and Peninsula.

Advices from Rampart, Alaska, give some wonderful accounts of the new Koyukuk district, of which Beech City is at present the commercial center.

At the request of the Idaho senators the renomination of John B. West as register of the Lewiston land office has been held up to await charges to be preferred by the people of that district.

The scandals growing out of the irregularities in the Nome district receive airing from time to time, and in spite of all efforts to the contrary, it looks as if an investigation was going to be forced.

The Washington Times confirms the statement made in the dispatches that the president has positively and finally refused to appoint B. D. Crocker, of Walla Walla, as Collector of Customs for Washington.

Dr. James Withycombe, director of the Oregon Agricultural College experiment station, is in Washington conferring with the secretary of agriculture, Dr. True, and other bureau chiefs, regarding problems which are of interest to Oregon agriculturists.

Governor McBride appointed an entire new board of Columbia river and Bar Pilot commissioners for Washington, appointments to take effect at the expiration of the term of the present board, February 17. The new commissioners will be Charles E. Kerlee and John Wilson, of Ilwaco, and Charles Payne, of Chinook. Retiring commissioners are J. J. Brumbach and N. C. Koford, of Ilwaco, and J. D. English, of Long Beach.

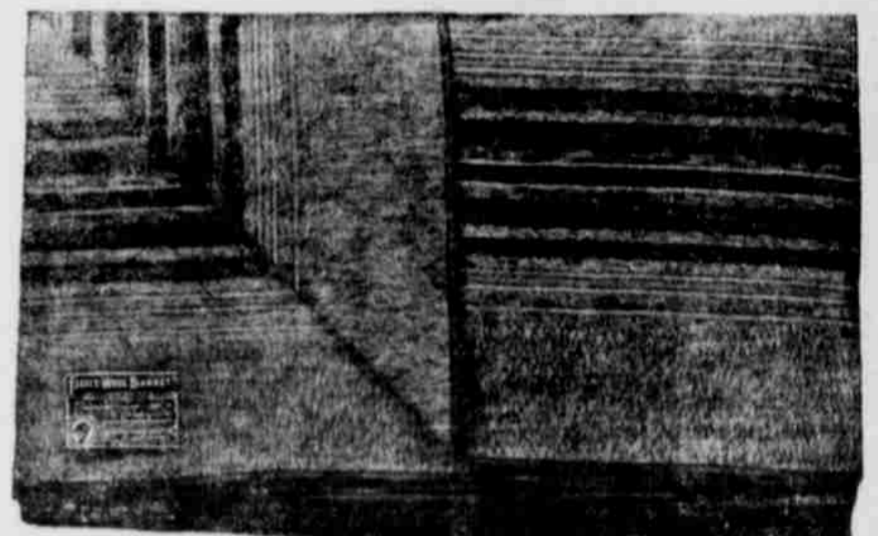
