## DR. McLEAN ADVISES

### HOW TO ERADICATE THE PLAGUE OF SWINE.

State Veterinarian Gives Wholesome Advice to Those Engaged in the Industry.

Dr. William McLean, state veterinarian, who spent all day yesterday holding post-mortem examinations on hogs that were sick or had died from the disease which has been so prevalent through the country recently and which was pronounced swine plague by Dr. Christie, simply verifies the latter's statements. To the East Oregonian he said:

"There is little to say in regard to the disease that is killing the hogs around Pendleton more than what was in the interview from me yesterday. I found everything as I said in that. It is swine plague, but it is in a mild form now, and I do not anticipate another serious outbreak. During the fall, I find, quite a number of young hogs died with the disease and as I said before, the disease has been in a mild form and I attribute most of the deaths to the fact that the hogs have not had proper care. They have been let run down physically by not enough attention being paid to their diet, and when they are in a weakened condition their system is in shape to take in any disease germ that is about, just the same as a human being is more likely to disease when his system is in bad shape. This disease, which was in the country, attacked these hogs when weak, and they lacked the strength to throw off the attack and consequently succumbed. Then it spread from one place to another. I do not mean to say that swine plague will not attack older hogs, or that it only attacks them when they are thin and weak, but it is more likely to attack them in that condition than when they are in good physical condition and are being fed plenty of substantial food. The disease is dying out here. In our investigations, Dr. Christie and I found only three sick hogs which belonged to Perry Houser. These were killed and buried.

"If those who are in the swine business will keep their pens clean and feed substantial food, I think it will soon die out and there will be little more trouble from the plague. I advise all who are in the business to keep their pens perfectly clean and if possible have two apartments, keeping them in one a day or two and then turn them into the other, while the first is thoroughly cleaned and dried out. It is a good plan to sprinkle lime over the pens for a disinfectant. Then, after this pen is thoroughly dried and cleaned, turn the hogs back and treat the other apartment in the same way. If this is done and the feed is changed occasionally, not giving the same thing all the time, but giving the hogs a variety of food, there will be no complaint from swine plague.

"When one does get the disease, there is only one plan to pursue, and that is to get it away from the others at once, kill and bury it. Then one should be careful to clean his boots before he returns to the pen where the other hogs are, for there is great danger of carrying the germ on the feet."

Dr. McLean said that although people were somewhat alarmed over the outlook for the hog industry in this country for the future on account of the recent fatalities from the plague, there was no reason for the raisers to go out of the business, as the industry was not injured so far, and if people used proper sanitary precautions there was no reason for many deaths.

### TAX SALE ON MONDAY.

Sheriff will Have a Small Amount to Sell.

Next Monday, February 10, is the date set by the sheriff of Umatilla county for the sale of property for which taxes have become delinquent. This sale will be at the court house and conducted under the supervision of the sheriff and the property will be "knocked down" to the highest bidder for cash. This is the first delinquent sale for the 1900 assessment roll.

Never in the history of the county has the delinquent tax roll been so small as this one, which, by the time of the sale Monday will not amount to more than \$500 or \$600. This is a remarkable record and shows the prosperous condition of the county.

The work of posting up the tax collection roll books for 1901 is progressing rapidly and the levy will be ready by the first of March. All taxes paid between that time and the 15th will have 3 per cent discount. This will amount to several dollars to the farmer who is paying tax on several hundred acres of land and other property and it is expected that the many will take advantage of the discount.

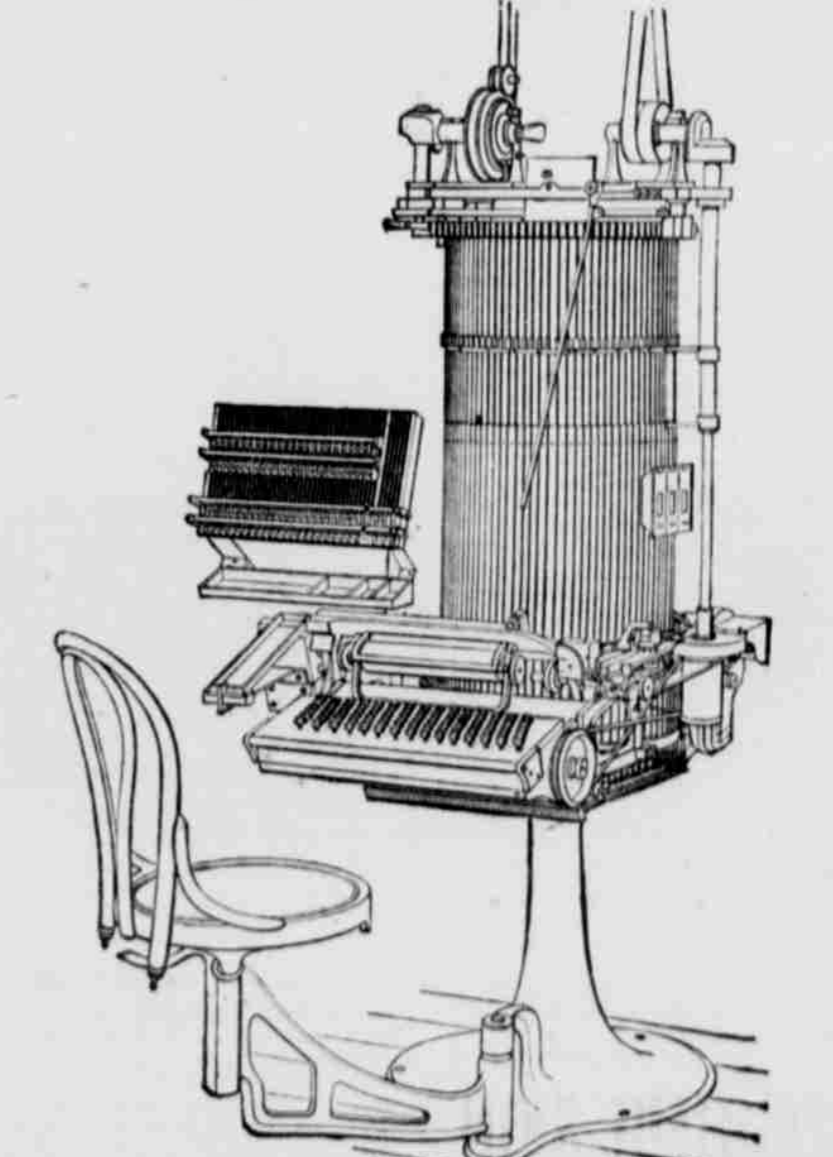
