Marriage Feels Long Life.

Dr. Filz, the leading German statistician, is satisfied, after many years of collecting materials, that married persons live longer than single persons. The death rate among persons between 20 and 30 years of age is 6.7 per 1000, unmarried 8.4; between 30 and 40 married 9.1, unmarried 15.8; between 40 and 50 married 14.2; unmarried 26.5; from 50 to 60 married 24; unmarried 42; between 60 and 70 the proportions are, married 45; unmarried 71. These figures prove that the deaths of married persons between 30 and 70 are three-fifths less than of unmarried. The average life of the unmarried person who passes 21 is 58.7, of the married, 64.4.
