

ASK GAMES STOPPED

A CAMPAIGN AGAINST SUNDAY AMUSEMENTS.

Umatilla County Sunday School Workers Adopt Resolutions and Present a Petition to the Railroad Company. The Sunday School Association of Umatilla county, at the meeting in Athena last week, took strong ground against the countenancing of Sunday games, and the running of Sunday excursion trains, and called upon District Attorney and Mayor T. G. Halley to suppress the games here this summer.

LAMBING TO BEGIN- EARLY UNDER SHEDS. Sheep Men Do This to Secure Early Lambs for July Mutton. Under sheds for shelter and to secure lambs for fattening for the July market a number of Umatilla county sheep men are now engaged in lambing. This is for the purpose, also, of fattening the ewes for earlier sale as mutton. The sheep men who follow this plan breed a certain number of ewes early, so as to bring the lambs in the first days of February, and enable the fattening of both ewes and lambs for the demand for fat mutton early in the summer. The lambing under sheds also causes a larger percentage of lambs to be saved than would be the case were the lambing done in the open and exposed to the weather. It is claimed that fat lambs ready for market in July will bring \$2.75 each here in Pendleton.

BAKER GIVES UP THE BAKER CITY THEATRE Lee H. Pearl Likely to be the Successor of the Portland Man. George L. Baker, manager of the Baker theatrical circuit, which includes opera houses in Portland, Pendleton and Baker City, came up from the Webfoot metropolis Wednesday to attend a meeting of the board of directors of the Baker City opera house, says the Baker City Herald. The board met and adjourned that evening without transacting any business, and Mr. Baker returned to Portland on the early morning train yesterday. Last night at an adjourned meeting of the board Mr. Baker's resignation as manager of the local playhouse was read. No action was taken by the board, pending a full meeting of the directors. It is probable that Manager Baker's resignation will be accepted and the control placed in the able hands of Lee H. Pearl.

MURDER IN SECOND DEGREE FOR WRECKER Colored Man Who Derailed O. R. & N. Passenger Sentenced. Addison Kidd, wrecker of the O. R. & N. passenger train near Celilo, was arraigned before Judge Bradshaw in The Dalles. The law of 1893, which applies to cases of this kind, makes the crime murder in second degree, and to this charge Kidd pleaded guilty. As the prisoner waived further trial, the judge at once sentenced him to the penitentiary for life. He was taken to Salem.
