GENERAL NEWS

The 25th anniversary of Emperor William's entrance into active service in the first regiment of the guards was commemorated at Potsdam on Sunday.

As a result of the recent Cutts case at Harvard, some of the Eastern authorities are advocating the establishment of an inter-collegiate board of arbitrators to have final jurisdiction in such cases.

At Paris the Hindoo twins, Radien and Dorinda, who were united in a manner similar to the Siamese twins, who were exhibited throughout the world, were separated by Dr. Denoyon. The operation lasted 20 minutes and was successful.

The governor of the town of Cayuga, in the Province of Misamis, Mindanao, has resigned, desiring that the military authorities there do not recognize his authority in refusing to receive his writs of habeas corpus.

The little government tugboat Fortuna, now in drydock at Charleston, Maryland, will be placed in commission within two weeks to start on a tour around Cape Horn to Puget Sound, the longest trip that a tugboat ever attempted. She is a small but very powerful tugboat, attached to the navy department.

The steamship Philadelphia, of the American line, broke the record for having the longest communication with the land by means of the Marconi wireless telegraph system, February 1, the steamship being at 12:15 p. m. a few miles off the Lizard. Messages were then exchanged and the telegraphing was kept up until midnight of the following day. The last message was sent when the Philadelphia was 150 miles distant from the island.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS

The track athletes of the University of Washington are preparing for a busy season, and the prospects for a winning team are brighter than usual.

The announcement of the dissolution of the firm of Pease & Mays, given in the Chronicle Saturday, says The Dulles Chronicle, caused quite a sensation throughout the city.

Plans and drawings for a machine for sawing down trees for lumber, have been nearly completed by a machinist of Portland who feels confident that his machine will prove a success.

There is a very general movement on the part of Portland citizens to get the streets of that city in good condition, and the amount of work during the street department in the face, in the way of street improvements is something startling.

The total number of voters who have registered with the clerk of Multnomah county court is in round figures, 4500. The total number of votes which it is estimated, will be cast at the June election is 23,000. These figures show that there are more than 17,000 unregistered voters, about 15,000 in the city and 3500 outside the municipal limits.

Edward Clark, who, with a man named Sullivan, robbed a saloon and shot the bartender in Anaconda, Mont., four years ago, was arrested in Portland by Deputy Sheriff Matthews and is lodged in the county jail awaiting advice from the scene of his crime. Clark has been positively identified by Robert Herold, a Montana volunteer in the Philippine war, who knows him well.

Just one week ago today we had a mail from Heppner, says the Long Creek Ranger, but none since. This is an outrage upon this section of country, which gets on an average no less than 300 pounds of mail per day. Uncle Sam should contract with someone to carry this mail to the settlers on this line, because they have arranged their business matters in accordance with the mail service heretofore given them, but to shut off the service all at once will cause much loss and damage to many. J. P. McMANUS' LONG

TRAMP FROM PASCO.

He Was Taken for a Professional, But

Denied the Soft Impeachment. J. P. McManus returned Sunday morning from the woolgrowers' convention at Helena, where he went as a delegate from Pendleton. He says that Oregon was not represented at the convention by a single woolgrower there only being two or three men in attendance from the state.

He says the delegates were royally entertained by the people of that city.

One of the experiences of Mr. McManus on his return is worth mentioning. He came down via the Northern Pacific and on account of meeting a freight train the train he was on was delayed several hours, and when they reached Pasco Saturday morning the W. & C. R. had pulled out. There is only one train a day each way on this line from here to Pasco, and no Sunday train, so he would have to stay in Pasco until Monday morning, and he waited for the next train. This, however, he did not propose to do, so he took his grip, kodak and heavy overcoat on his arm and started out to walk to Wallula, a distance of 17 miles along the railroad. On this whole route he says he never saw a living thing of any description—not even a bird or rabbit and that it was the loneliest and most desolate tramp he ever took. However, he made good time, being a little less than 24 hours making the trip.

"When I reached Wallula," said Mr. McManus, "I was hungry and tired, and seeing a house with a sign saying 'board' over the door, I went in. After several minutes I was able to find a girl. I told her I was hungry and wanted something to eat. She set me out a lunch and said when she 'seed me comin' she thought I was a tramp. I told her I was considerably of a tramp, as I had just tramped 17 miles that morning."

Mr. McManus stayed there until 11:25 that night, when he left for Umatilla and arrived here Sunday morning.

IT WAS 100 YEARS AGO

WHEN THEY PROVED THAT
HARD COAL WAS USEFUL.

Centennial of the Demonstration in Wilkesbarre, Pa., Was Celebrated Elaborately.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., Feb. 11.—One hundred years ago today the leading residents of the town of Wilkesbarre gathered in Fell's tavern and successfully demonstrated the practical value of anthracite coal as fuel. The winter was severe, and rumors having reached the town that the "black rock," which was found about the town in plenty, was a fuel and gave good heat, it was decided to try it. At first the landlord of the tavern hesitated, owing to the expense incurred in building a new fireplace, but after several friends volunteered to stand their share, Mr. Fell consented. A grate was built and most of the notable persons in the town assembled at the tavern to see the event, which was successful beyond their most sanguine expectations. Mr. Fell and his companions circled eagerly about the fireplace, piled wood upon the bottom of the grate, dumped coal on top, and after lighting it, watched breathlessly for results. After awhile some of the coal was seen to fall apart, but the greater part of it glowed, and soon after burned merrily. After the incident of that night the practical use of anthracite coal was assured.

The Historic Event.

Today, in celebration of the centennial, the city officials of Wilkesbarre and men prominently identified with the coal industry of Pennsylvania and other states, assembled in the room where the historic experiment was made and listened to papers and addresses commemorative of the event. The grate which was used on the eventful night of February 11, 1802, still exists. It was the center of much attraction at the Centennial Exposition in Philadelphia in 1876, and was stolen at the close of the exhibition. Detectives recovered it after weeks of search. Later it was stolen again and again recovered. The wall which first held it crumbled some time ago, but was rebuilt and made to look just like the original.
