EARLY MILD WEATHER.

Gardening is Going On in All Directions—A Cold Snap May Come.

If the weather of the past two weeks keeps up, it will only be a short time until the trees will begin to bud in earnest and all herbage will begin to put on its green coat. Gardeners are already getting themselves in readiness for planting and some have put seed of the tougher varieties in the ground so that they may have early vegetables. Onions and spinach will be as usual, the first on the market. Few potatoes have yet been planted, although it is predicted by many that spring is here in earnest and that there will be no more cold weather to amount to anything. This may prove true but it will be remarkable if there come no more chilling weather during March, and a little snow is nothing unusual for that month.

It is too early to forecast the outlook for crops of any kind, but from the present outlook there will be a good crop of most every variety of fruit and vegetables this year. This, however, depends largely on the weather from now on, and if it keeps warm until everything is very far along and growth is started in earnest, and then comes a cold snap and hard frosts, injury will be sure to result. Onions that were sown in the fall were touched in most places by the cold, but it will not amount to much with them as they will come out and their growth will hardly be checked by the nipping. In two or three weeks they will be in the market in abundance. Other vegetables, of course, will be a little later, but with a continuance of good weather all kinds of fresh vegetables will soon be on the market.

GROWTH OF BUSINESS.

The Year 1901 One of Extraordinary Prosperity.

The year 1901 will be remembered, says the New York Journal of Commerce, as one of extraordinary prosperity in almost every branch of the industrial and commercial activity of the United States, as one of liberal returns for the products of agriculture, in spite of short corn and cotton crops, and of unexampled expansion in the operations of finance. The number of shares dealt in on the New York Stock Exchange has almost doubled in one year, and their value has nearly quadrupled; there has been an increase of about 40 per cent in the amount of the transactions passing through the New York Clearing House, and of nearly 20 per cent in the loans and discounts of the national banks of the country. Over 5000 miles of railroad were built in the United States last year, and on the whole 197,500 miles of railway a business was done equal to at least \$1,500,000,000 of gross and \$595,000,000 of net earnings. In the face of a large decrease in copper shipments, there was an increase of 11 per cent in the year's traffic on the Great Lakes, as measured by the tonnage passing through the canals at the entrance of Lake Superior.
