THE TIDE OF IMMIGRATION.
Flood to West has Begun in Earnest, Homeseekers from Everywhere.
The homeseekers' movement is now fairly on and tourists are now beginning to pour into the northwestern country to seek homes for themselves and their friends. The conductors on the trains say that not a day passes but that from one to a dozen families are on the train coming from all parts of the eastern and middle states looking to better their conditions in life or for a milder climate in which to reside. The general rush is not yet on, and when it fairly starts the trains will be loaded, as the movement west is expected to be greater this year than ever before in the history of the country. In some instances "experimental tourists," as a great many of those coming now are called, who are advance agents for others, taking advantage of the transportation companies' low round-trip rates, to visit the western states to view its advantages and return again for their families or report their findings to their friends in whose interest they make the trip. Washington is getting the larger proportion of those coming now, but not all of them are bound for that state, as every few days a family drops off at Pendleton and other towns in Umatilla county, to go into the country to look for a bargain in land that is for sale or for a place to rent. Quite a number of these people are going into the more sparsely settled part of the state—Malheur and Harney counties—and into the John Day country, where they aim to go into the stock business or farming as the opportunity may offer.
Franklin P. Adams, from Duluth, is one of the advance guard for a company of Minnesotans who are figuring on coming to Eastern Oregon and have sent him to invest their money. He is looking principally for grazing lands, and to a reporter for the Walla Walla Union, while in that city recently, Mr. Adams said:
"There will be large numbers of homeseekers come west this year and their arrival will mean more to this section of the country than did even the advance of the pioneers 50 years ago. In the past there have been many settlers avail themselves of the rates made by the railroad companies, but never before have the people of the east and middle west migrated with so clear an understanding of what they were to find. If you watch the people who come to the northwest this year you will see they are families with money. The too long prevailing idea that the northwest was a vast wilderness where land was to be had for squatting upon it has disappeared, and eastern people have begun to realize that in order to be successful here they must apply practical knowledge the same as in any other civilized section.
