THE AXE WIELDERS

GOOD WORK ACCOMPLISHED
ALL ALONG THE LINE.

A Great Crowd of the Woodmen of the World Booked for Pendleton for the Log-Rolling, April 21-22.

George K. Rogers, general Northwest deputy of the Woodmen of the World, returned from Portland and The Dalles Wednesday. While in Portland last Monday he consulted with the various railway officials in regard to special rates and was assured that all lines would make exceptionally favorable rates into this city for the great log-rolling, April 21-22 next. Because of the tremendous excursions which the Woodmen of the World have been running throughout the Northwest during the last two or three years, the railway people have come to value the patronage of the "axe wielders." Mr. Rogers also arranged for some of the splendid Woodmen drill teams to be present to exemplify the beautiful and intricate dramatic and drill work of the order. This fact alone will bring every Woodman for a couple of hundred miles around to Pendleton. Mr. Rogers says that these teams will give public drills in fancy military movements, and of the many attractions which are proposed, he states these will be the most attractive, and will delight and surprise all who see them.

At The Dalles Neighbor Rogers found a wave of enthusiasm which he describes as "threatening to sweep that town into the Columbia river." Three weeks ago The Dalles circle and camp swung into line and started out for 202 candidates for the tremendous affair. Night before last a joint meeting of the camp and circle was held and it was found that the camp had already received 25 applications and the circle 17. No regular business was transacted, but a royal banquet was tendered to Mr. Rogers and a promise to surprise the "bunch-grassers" was given him to carry to the Pendletonians.

Here in Pendleton the work is going forward with a zest that promises an equal surprise to the visitors who will be present from all parts of the state. Mr. Rogers found after a three days' trip an immense amount of mail awaiting him from different points all over Oregon and parts of Washington and Idaho, asking about the expected gathering. A curious letter recently received by the president of the general committee, was written by a convict in the state's prison in Montana. He stated that he had read in the East Oregonian of the mammoth affair which is expected to take place here soon and wanted to know if certain fancy work which he makes could not be put on sale during Woodmen week.

Next week the proper local committee will report on the various attractions which will be introduced to entertain the visitors, and something novel and striking may well be looked for.

Mr. Rogers will go to Baker City, Sumpter and La Grande next week in the interest of the Pendleton log-rolling. That territory has already promised to come, but since visits have been made westward as far as Portland, and northward as far as Pomeroy it is felt but justice that a personal "invitation in boots" be also sent to the farther eastern points. A little later on visits will also be made to all intermediate points between Boise City and Pendleton and between Spokane and this city, so that the field will be thoroughly awakened to the magnitude of the enormous affair. Great double-sheet posters, printed in two colors, are also to be posted in every town and village in Oregon, Western Idaho and Eastern Washington.

Some little misunderstanding has been found to exist in the public mind with reference to the Woodmen of the World and another order with a very similar name, and it has been found that many parties who desire to join and be a part of the great class have mistakenly given their applications to the sister society. However, Mr. Rogers states that while the Woodmen of the World had perhaps lost some candidates through misunderstanding, they might also have gained some who were anticipating joining some of the other orders. As to the differences between the Woodmen of the World and other societies regarding insurance, Mr. Rogers said that the strongest argument the Woodmen of the World presents is that it has a reserve fund for the protection of its members at an advanced age, or in case of any unusual death rate. "This reserve fund was not created without considerable effort on the part of our esteemed head consul, F. A. Falkenberg," continued Mr. Rogers. "In 1898, at the San Francisco session of the head camp, it was finally adopted, even then against the arguments of many who have since become its most ardent supporters. The history of fraternal orders is pathetically marked by fallen societies which have been organized, have done considerable business upon the foundation of sand, without the reserve fund, and in times of necessity have been obliged to suspend. It has been demonstrated time and again by actual experience that the only way in which an insurance company or soci-

ety can be successfully perpetuated is by having a reserve fund, and this is what the Woodmen of the World, in defiance of the wishes of some of its best friends prior to the time of the adoption of this safeguard, have adopted, and upon which their base their ability to pay claims at the end of any period of time, and not at some of the ephemeral organizations, be obliged to fall in time of trouble. This reserve fund is created by means of three special assessments per annum levied for that purpose and all the money collected from the regular assessments which is not needed for the payment of death claims and the expenses of management is turned into the reserve, with the result that the fund is now in a most healthy and flourishing condition.

It is to be regretted that other organizations have not seen the expediency of adopting this proposition, for every person who has made a study of fraternal insurance knows that the death rate must necessarily increase with age, and that without

adequate means to meet this increase death rate, the living members must either be assessed at an increased rate or the organization cannot meet its obligations.

Fight to the Death.

Two dead Indians and the stiff carcass of a grizzly bear lying together in the woods were found at Rivers Inlet, B. C., two days ago. Both Indian and grizzly had been mortally wounded in a combat which must have been terrific, as all around the corpses were signs of the struggle for life made by the two hunters. About 30 feet from the bodies lay an old smooth-bore muzzle-loading rifle, and driven to the hilt in the heart of the bear was found a long hunting knife, while another similar weapon lay beside one of the Indians.

Hands in County's Pocket.

At the last session of the Oregon legislature a law was enacted fixing the compensation of the county commissioners of Multnomah at \$3 a day.

The intention of the framers of the measure was that the amount specified should be paid each commissioner for each day consumed in the transaction of county business. The commissioners in Multnomah county have construed the law to include Sundays and every day draw from the county \$3 each, whether they are in session or not. The commissioners are William Showers and J. G. Mack.
