GOVERNOR FURNISH

UMATILLA COUNTY REBUBLI-
CANS FAVOR HIM

Out of the 101 Delegates to the Re-
publican County Convention 95 to
100 are said to be Furnish Men.

The republican primaries passed
off quietly all over the county Friday.
The only contest waged was between
S. A. Lowell and W. J. Furnish, who
were aspirants for the nomination on
the republican ticket for governor
of the state of Oregon and each had
their men in the field working for the
election of their respective delegates.

The result was a surprise to all.
Up until a few days ago, Lowell's
friends were confident that they stood
as good a show for polling the major-
ity of the votes in the county as were
Furnish's, but the result was a victory
for the latter. He carried Pendleton
for his delegates by a majority
of nearly 3 to 1 and in East Pendleton,
Lowell's own precinct, the
Furnish men won out by a majority
of 87 votes, the vote standing 128 to
41. In South Pendleton precinct, the
vote was 119 and the Furnish side
won by a majority of 63. Pendleton
precinct cast 136 votes and Lowell
got 21 to Furnish's 115, while in
North Pendleton, the vote was 71 for
Lowell, and 120 for Furnish. Taking
the city over, Furnish delegates re-
ceived 454 votes and Lowell's only
161, making over 615 votes that were
cast in the city. Out of the 110 de-
legates elected to the county conven-
tion, 95 to 100 of them favor Furnish
for governor.

The votes cast in all the precincts
are not obtainable up to the present
time but the delegates from the various
precincts are as follows:

Taxation of Property.
Assessor Everetts, of Connell
Bluffs, Iowa, has included in his as-
sessment roll the property of the
Portland Mining company, whose
headquarters are in that city, but
whose property holdings are in Gol-
conda, Iowa. Iowa code makes a provision
for taxing corporations having their
principal place of business within
the state. The local representatives
of the company refused to make a
statement of its taxable property and
the assessor has decided to assess
the company on the basis of its al-
leged actual valuation of \$9,000,000,
as provided by the laws. The recent
Burns-Doyle suit for possession of
\$1,000,000 of stock in the Portland
company, the assessor says, formed
a basis for calculation on the value
of its property. Suit may follow.

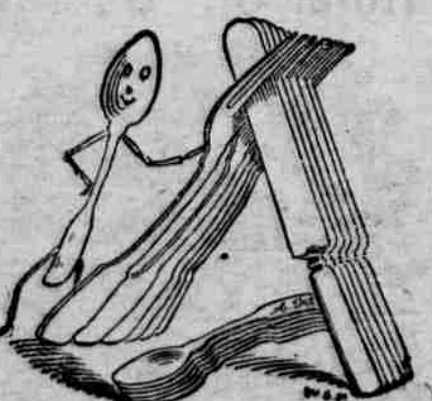
