Harry Turner started for the Washuena country, in Franklin county, Tuesday, with a large outfit. He has leased two sections of land and will do a large amount of plowing. Mr. and Mrs. Sam Morgan and James Road accompanied him. Mr. Turner will take rank in Franklin county with Uncle Jim Elgin, Colonel Wood and other extensive farmers.

CHINA TOWN NOISES.

Complaint Made Against the Musicians of That Neighborhood.

There has been considerable complaint recently about the noise the Chinamen are making every night at their quarters in Chinatown, and those who are making the complaint have good ground for a kick. Residents of several blocks around these Chinese dens stood the noise for several weeks during the time they were celebrating new year, and said nothing, and it was thought that when this period was ended they would let up, but this has not been the case, as every night there is a continual racket produced by the most discordant notes from various kinds of instruments known to the almond-eyed race for producing what they call music, but what, to the ear of a white man, is nothing but whine and a grind, most nerve-grating at that. Should a crowd of white people gather in the city and create so much noise every night and keep it up until a late hour they would be stopped or ordered out of town by the police, for those living in the immediate vicinity would not put up with it, but the Chinamen are allowed to keep this thing up night after night and nothing is said about it. Some are getting very tired of this thing, however, and complaint is likely to be made at any time unless there is a stop put to it.

BARBED WIRE 'PHONES.

Farmers Are Putting Them in and Supplies Are in Demand.

There has never before in the history of the Northwest been so great a demand for telephone supplies as at the present. From all sections of the Walla Walla valley, says the Union, demands are coming into Walla Walla for 'phones and receivers and transmitters. The barbed wire telephone is getting a firmer grip upon the people of this community every day and the demand has vastly outrun the supply. will not dispose of either of the articles named, and there is not another establishment which has them in stock. Therefore, those who are looking for telephone material are going begging. The claim is made that the only course left open is for them to club together and have shipments made direct from the eastern factories.

The plan followed by the Dixie vicinity farmers who are using barbed wire lines was to get a sufficient number to insure a well established circuit and an even division of expenses and then to send east for the supplies needed. Wallula followed the same course at first, but later sent a call to Walla Walla for supplies with the result that they are still being searched for.

Out on Eureka Flat the farmers are getting the talking fence craze and it was reported in this city that an extensive system would be placed in operation there in a short time. It is rumored the line will make connection with the Prescott-Waltsburg line at the former town, and will form a continuous barbed wire line from Waltsburg to Clyde, switch connections being put in Prescott. Other lines are projected in different sections of the valley, and from Umatilla county the story comes that a perfect net work of fence 'phones are already in operation.

Preparation for Placer Mine.

Charles Baker left town this morning with six horses and two wagons, loaded with 10,000 pounds of iron piping, which is going to the Oriental mine, on the north fork of the John Day river. The 10-inch piping is to be used at the Oriental in connection with a lot of other new machinery that is being placed at the mine, which will start up in full blast as soon as everything is in place. It is about 65 miles from here to the mine and Mr. Baker contemplates being 15 days getting his load to its destination. He will be able to go with the two wagons to Alba, and there have to unload and make the rest of the way with one wagon. This will compel him to make several trips from there on. The roads are said to be very bad between here and the John Day country and in places are almost impassable.

Made Lots of Money.

Deputy County Clerk George Aiken is always making money, says the Baker City Herald. The other day he found \$800 in a letter from a friend whom he had grubstaked to go to the Klondike. Monday he made \$30,751, which is a fairly good day's work for a man of George's years. He made the money \$1,000 at a whack with his little pen. He made out 31 county warrants, 30 of which were for \$1000, and the other calling for the mere bagatelle of \$751. The warrants were made payable to Union county; but George made 'em and they are nearly as good as gold. They are in payment of that share of Union county's indebtedness which Baker county assumed when the Panhandle was annexed to this county.

Concerning Mountain Strawberries.

C. O. Jeffrey, a well-known farmer of Weston mountains, says the Leader contemplates setting out a 10-acre patch of strawberries this spring. It may be said without exaggeration, that Weston mountain grows the finest berries in the known world, and unquestionably their cultivation on a more extended scale would swell the pocketbooks of the farmers in this rich region and benefit the community. Mr. Jeffrey urges that every mountain farmer set out at least a five-acre patch, so that enough berries may be grown to establish a better shipping market. At present nearly all the mountain product is sold to local consumers, who buy the berries readily at \$1.50 a crate. They ripen late in the season after the Hood River and Walla Walla crop is exhausted, and as everybody admires their size and flavor, they never fail to find eager purchasers.

INTEREST TO CATTLE MEN.

Certain Bills That Have Been Introduced in Congress.

Secretary Charles F. Martin, of the National Livestock Association, has issued a bulletin calling the attention of stockmen to the present status of certain bills of interest to the livestock industry now before congress.

These bills are H. R. 6565, by Congressman Grosvenor, of Ohio, to prevent the sale of shoddy goods as pure wool; S. B. 2588, by Senator Penrose, of Pennsylvania, to provide for the improvement in breeding horses for general purpose use; H. R. 10305, providing for a permanent census bureau and an annual classified census of livestock; others asking for federal aid in the reclamation of arid and semi-arid lands of the West by irrigation, that the interstate commerce act be amended so as to give the commission judiciary power for the admission of the territories of New Mexico, Arizona and Oklahoma to statehood, and the Henry oleomargarine bill.

After stating the exact position in legislative progress that has been reached by each bill, the bulletin says:

"Every man engaged in the industry should immediately send a strong letter to the chairman of the committee named and to the senators and congressmen from their state, urging upon them to earnestly work for the passage of the Grosvenor shoddy bill, for the passage of Senator Penrose's horse bill, for the passage of the irrigation bill and for the defeat of the Henry oleomargarine bill. This will take but five minutes' time and 5 cents in cash, while millions annually are involved and depend upon prompt and energetic compliance with this request."

TWO OREGON APPLES.

Brought Seventeen Men From Ohio to Settle in Oregon.

Among the arrivals Thursday in Portland over the Northern Pacific, were 17 men from Ohio, who are going over into Yamhill county to engage in raising broomcorn. They say that the soil in that section is particularly adapted to broomcorn culture. One of the men was here last year, he said, and looked over the field, returning to Ohio in the fall. A reporter asked one of the men what induced him to come to Oregon.

"Why," said he, "I was down to Omaha in August, 1898, to see the exposition, and a little woman, whose name I have forgotten, gave me two apples. I took them to my Ohio home and exhibited them until I could resist the temptation no longer to eat them. I was so well pleased with the flavor that I determined to see the land that

produced them. I came out last fall and was so well pleased with Nehalem valley section that I determined to make this state my home. I am here accompanied by 16 others, all the result of the giving of two apples to me."

Along the banks of the Walla Walla river and down the Columbia below the Old Town, there will be larger patches than have ever before been seen there. It is hoped that arrangements can be made for shipment direct from the local stations into Montana markets where there is always a ready sale for the melons from this section. Spokane also buys largely from here and Walla Walla, and Pendleton get their best melons from this locality. A great deal of potatoes will be planted on the hills and the crop is expected to be large.

The Coliseum Athletic Club, of Denver, will offer a \$20,000 purse or 65 per cent of the gross receipts for the Jeffries-Fitzsimmons fight. The officials talk of holding the contest at Arlington Park and will construct an amphitheater to seat 20,000 people.

It is reported that General Dewet and ex-President Steyn crossed the main river line during the night of March 9, four miles north of Wolvehoek, going west.
