### GENERAL NEWS

A young Berlin physician, Dr. Ludwig Feinberg, has made an important discovery of independent animal organisms in cancerous growths. This discovery, he says, means the diagnosis of cancer.

It is understood that Frank P. Sargent, the chief of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen will accept the office of Commissioner of Immigration in the treasury department when it is formally offered him.

John Lawson, known as the "Terrible Swede," a professional bicycle rider of international fame, died of pneumonia in a Milwaukee hospital Sunday. Lawson had resided in that city for the past four years.

Because a Chinaman threw a stone at Baroness Avezzana, wife of the secretary of the Italian legation at Peking, while she was passing in the street, the dowager empress has issued an edict sternly admonishing the Chinese against insulting foreigners.

Willard Smith, 20 years of age, who sought to blackmail a merchant of the town of Tillie, Neb., was shot and killed by one of a party of four men set to entrap him. Smith wrote an anonymous letter demanding money, which he went to secure, and, resisting capture, was killed.

Senator Dubois made an emphatic speech in the senate in support of the resolution providing for the election of United States senators by direct vote of the people. He reminded the senate that 29 state legislatures have demanded that congress submit the proposition to the people, and that in the past 10 years bills for this purpose have been passed by the house and ignored by the senate.

### PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS

A. Lipman, a tailor of Portland, has filed a petition in bankruptcy in the United States court, his liabilities being \$7836.49, with no assets.

Mary E. Morrell, of La Grande, through her attorney, Colonel Emmett Callahan, has filed suit for divorce against her husband, Rena Morrell, whom, she alleges, deserted her in the year following their marriage in August, 1899.

Reese Evans and A. A. Smith fought a duel with Winchester at eight feet distant, Sunday, at Purdy station, on the Nevada, California & Oregon Railway. The quarrel was over a strip of land worth hardly more than the ammunition expended. Both men were killed.

No one has yet been named to succeed B. Campbell as traffic manager of the O. R. & N., but there is an impression in railroad circles that the office will be filled soon, probably before April 1. T. M. Schumacher, now acting traffic manager of the Oregon Short Line, is prominently mentioned for the position.

It is expected that within six weeks the right of way of the Central Navigation & Construction Company will be sold at public auction at Goldendale, Wash. This is what is commonly known as the Paul Mohr line, which was to connect Eastern Washington with Portland.

Julius Wagner, a butcher of Roseland, B. C., has fallen into a great fortune. Together with his mother, sister and brother, he will divide \$2,700,000 in cash, and \$1,000,000 in the shares of the Pullman-Wagner Palace Car Company. The first installment of the fortune will be distributed on May 1.

J. P. Cotton, who was shot by H. C. Messenger, at the former's saw mill, near Ashland, Southern Oregon, last Tuesday, died from his wounds Saturday evening. A charge of murder was promptly lodged against Messenger, who has been out on bail since his arrest, and the sheriff placed him in the Jacksonville jail without delay.

# DEATH WAS SUDDEN

WILLIAM POST DIES AT THE O. R. & N. DEPOT.

The Summons Came to Him Suddenly While He Was on His Way to the Soldiers Home at Boise—Mr. Post a Mexican War Veteran.

William Post, a Mexican war veteran, died very suddenly on the Boise train just before leaving the O. R. & N. depot in this city, at 5:30 Monday evening.

Mr. Post was on his way from Walla Walla, where he has made his home for several years, to the Soldiers' Home at Boise, and was apparently in very good health, not being very feeble. He got off the Walla Walla train and walked across the platform to the east-bound train and after getting aboard, fell dead without a word or struggle. The body was taken off the train and placed in the care of Coroner Cole, who had it removed to Jesse Failing's undertaking parlors, and there made an examination of the body, pronouncing heart failure as the immediate cause of death, although Mr. Post had evidently been suffering for some years with Bright's disease and other complications. In his pockets were found \$30 and a letter from his brother, J. W. Post. This letter was dated at Everett, Ind., February 17, 1902, and was in answer to a letter written by the dead man. It referred to the dead man having spoken of being ill and intimated that the cause of the illness was from the effects of poison some 10 years ago, which he had never entirely recovered from.

Mr. Post was 73 years of age and has no relatives nearer than Indiana. They have been notified by telegraph. He was buried this afternoon from Failing's undertaking parlors, under the auspices of the G. A. R. veterans of the city.

### MISS COGLAN AS STEPHANIE.

It Is Claimed She Acts Well the Part—At Frazer's Thursday Night.

"Forget Me Not" with Rose Cogan as Stephanie De Mohrivas, will prove a strong attraction at the Frazer Opera House on Thursday, March 20th, when this famous play receives its first presentation here with a cast of players who have supported Miss Cogan in many of her New York productions. The play is strongly dramatic, but never descends to the cheap trickery of melodrama even in the greatest scene which strips a mercenary adventuress of a position in society which she has held by means of intrigue, blackmail and effrontery with an ever present insolence and wily manner to disarm a coterie of enemies plotting her downfall. It is in the amazing self possession, in the exhibition of feminine wiles and coqueries when danger threatens the position she has usurped in society, as well as in the self command and stolidity exhibited during some intensely dramatic scenes that Rose Cogan shows she is past mistress of her art and equally able to depict a crushed, broken and terrified woman after her final downfall.

### The Explosive Lyddite.

The extraordinary effect of lyddite has been revealed by the statement that during the recent experiments with the hulk of the old battleship Belle Isle shells containing that explosive refracted fragments upon the attacking vessels, which were 300 yards distant. Other fragments dropped close to a gunboat situated 2000 yards ahead of the line of fire. The deduction drawn is that when lyddite is used there is danger for a friendly vessel at least 2000 yards away. The Outlook compares lyddite with a boomerang, and points out that to be of any use it must be dropped right on board a hostile vessel, for "if the projectile does not hit the right place it will fly back and slay the slayer."

William Simmons, aged 34, a resident of North Powder, died at St. Elizabeth's hospital, Baker City, after undergoing an operation for an abscess.

### ENGINE SCARED TEAM.

A Newcomer From Nebraska Suffers Small Damage to Property.

In a strange country and out of luck. That is the fate of Silas Peterson, who arrived Monday over the W. & C. R. from his far off home in Nebraska. Mr. Peterson has a large family and brought his household goods along with him, as well as his old farm wagon. This morning he secured a house in town and loaded part of his household goods into his wagon to haul to his place of abode. He left the W. & C. R. depot at few minutes before 11 o'clock and was coming up Webb street along the south side of the railroad track at the same time the train was pulling into the depot. The team did not like the appearance of the approaching locomotive and began to shy. Mr. Peterson had all he could do to keep the horses from turning around in the road and making a break to get away from the frightful looking engine, but he succeeded in keeping them from doing this. He did not keep them from backing, however, and the hind end of the wagon was backed up against the track. The engine was too close to the rig when he saw the impending danger to stop the locomotive and it struck one wheel of the wagon, with the result that the spindle of the opposite axle was broken off close to the wheel. In addition to the breaking of the wagon the other damage was slight. A cook stove sitting in the wagon was slightly injured.

It might be added here, that trainmen having conduct of locomotives on Webb street never "slow down" or show any concern when horses are frightened by the locomotive, being absolutely indifferent to the risk they impose upon those who suffer from their occupancy of the street. The council should regulate such matters and force the railroad to respect the rights of those driving horses by these iron steeds while in motion.

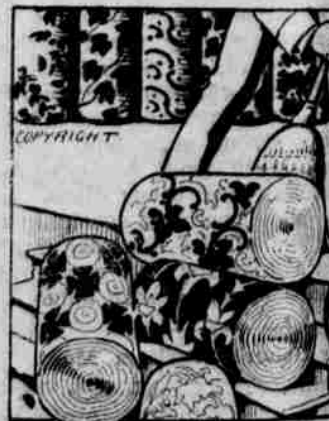

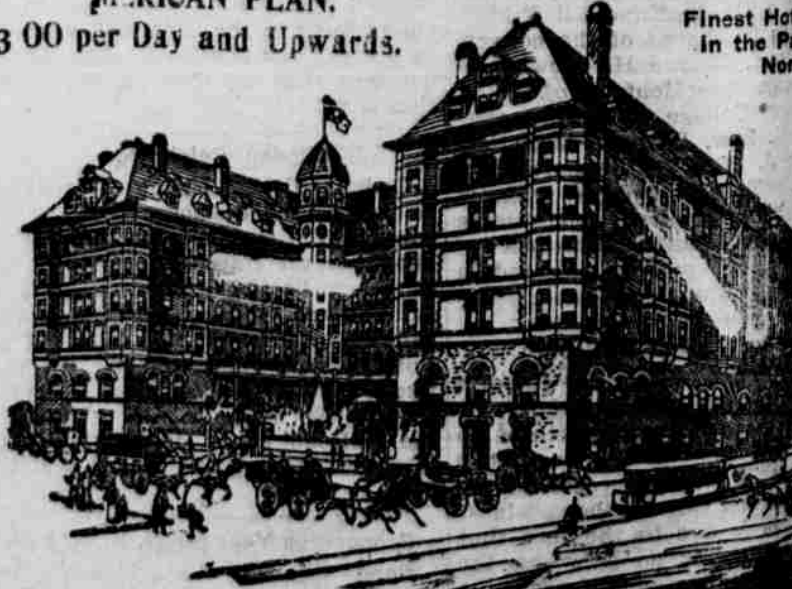
