Notorious Criminals Inundated With Offers of Marriage.

Neill Cream, the famous, or rather infamous prisoner; Deeming, the Australian wife killer; Fauntleroy and many others of the greatest scoundrels of our time, might have been married over and over again if justice had not substituted the halter for the altar; and for a woman to commit a crime, especially if she be at all good looking, is to awaken tender emotion in many manly breasts.

A few years ago when a certain young man of rank was charged with a particularly heartless crime, at least a score of silly women fell head over heels in love with him and inundated him with messages of sympathy, offers of financial help and marriage.

Every day of his trial some of them attended the court and exhausted every stratagem to get a word with him; and when he was sentenced to five years penal servitude, one woman, an absolute stranger to him, fainted in court.

So infatuated was one of his lovers that she went to live in the neighborhood of the prison where he served his sentence and was happy if she caught a glimpse of him as he went on his way to the quarries. Whether she married him or not ultimately I cannot say, but it was certainly not her fault if she didn't.

In another case which occurred at about the same time a young and pretty girl was charged with the manslaughter of her child under peculiarly sad conditions. Her case excited wide sympathy, and to my certain knowledge at least a dozen men wrote to make her offers of marriage. After a long trial she was acquitted, and one of her numerous lovers, a man of some wealth, found her a home, and at the end of six months led her to the altar. This strangely united couple are now living on the continent, and, as I hear from a friend of mine, who is an English captain there, are very happy together.

LEONORA JACKSON.

A Baker City Woman Speaks Personally of Her and of Her Genius.

Mrs. Francis Striegel Burke, of Baker City, writes of Leonora Jackson, who is coming to Pendleton on the evening of March 26th, at Frazer's opera house:

The writer has followed Miss Jackson's career since the latter, a tall, thin, reserved little girl, studied the violin in a Chicago institution, where the priter was taking piano lessons.

Leonora Jackson was recognized as an embryotic artist by the college faculty, and by all who heard her play, including George M. Pullman, whose protégée she became.

Her mother accompanied her everywhere, and guarded her from everything that might interfere with her progress toward Parnassus, finally taking her to Europe, where she became a favorite pupil of Joachim. He is the greatest of all violin teachers, and his approval means distinction for any young artist.

In October, 1896, the writer went to Berlin and heard from Leon Marx and other prominent Joachim pupils of Miss Jackson's phenomenal progress and of Joachim's deep interest in her. On October 17, the same night that introduced Ossip Gabrilovitch to the critical Prussian city, Miss Jackson made her Berlin debut. She played with the Philharmonic orchestra, Joachim conducting, and the enthusiasm of the audience was indescribable when this young, frail girl played the Brahms and mirable dictu, the Wieniawski concertos, and then the Ernst Hungarian dances, in a masterly way, stepping into success as she played. The great critics praised her next morning, and her career was practically determined. The first appearance before the monarchs of the musical world must have been a greater ordeal for Miss Jackson than any of her subsequent appearances before royalty.

Everyone knows Miss Jackson's recent history. Always accompanied by her devoted mother, she has gone from triumph to triumph, until she stands acknowledged the greatest woman violinist of our day—possibly of any day. Let no one fail to hear her, and since art is educational as well as pleasantly entertaining, send the young people. Such music as Miss Jackson's marks an epoch in the history of a town, and it will be long before we have another opportunity of hearing at our very doors the great literature of the violin, interpreted by so supreme an artist as Leonora Jackson.

EXTERMINATES PAIN.

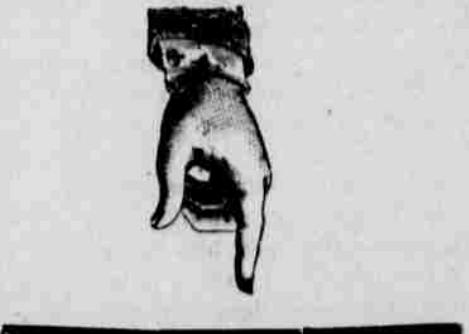
