MILES MAY QUIT

WOULD DO SO IF PRESENT BILL BE LAW.

Shows How the Measure Would Destroy the Unity of the Army.

Washington, March 20.—General Miles today told the senate committee on military affairs that if the proposed general staff bill should become a law he could not see his way clear to continue to hold his commission. He regarded the measure as contrary to the best interests of the military establishment and one which he could not countenance by remaining as lieutenant-general of the army. The portion of the bill to which he particularly objected was the provision that the senior general officer of the army shall be assigned to the command of such portion of the army as the president may direct or be detailed to duty in the general staff corps. He said that if this proposition became law it would destroy the unity of the army. He asserted that the bill would allow the secretary of war and adjutant-general of the army to promote interests of their own personal favorites. He told the committee that with the bill a law he could now name the men who would hold the places of honor provided under it, but he did not give the committee the names.

San Francisco, March 20.—Jimmy Britt, local champion lightweight, who recently defeated Hegarty, the Australian, challenged McGovern last night. A telegram was received here by Harry Corbett today. There is a strong rumor that McGovern has accepted the deft.
