The Japanese present were deeply impressed, and the following day a deputation of policemen came on board the transport, found the soldier and returned to him the amount of his fine—their own contribution—with words expressive of their appreciation and regard.

To Settle Big Labor Dispute. Washington, March 24.—Organized labor is watching with keen interest the proceedings in the supreme court of the district of Columbia, where arguments were commenced this morning in the suit to determine which of two factions is the legal order of the Knights of Labor. In well-informed circles it seems to be the general expectation that the faction represented by Secretary Hayes will win out, as it is incorporated and has possession of the headquarters and all the books, records and documents of the once-famous order. Moreover, the Parsons side has been restrained by the courts from doing business as the Knights of Labor and it is believed that the final outcome will be to make this restraint permanent.

They emanated from the office of Supervising Architect Taylor, of the treasury department, and were sent to Postmaster Stewart as a request for proposals for preparatory work in connection with the contract.
