GENERAL NEWS

Although the republican caucus voted some time ago in favor of Cuban reciprocity at 20 per cent, no action has been taken by the ways and means committee further than the introduction of a bill to that effect by its chairman. The reason for the delay has been that continued efforts are being made to secure practically unanimous action in favor of the reciprocity plan.

What is popularly known as the oleomargarine bill places a tax of 10 cents a pound on oleomargarine colored in imitation of butter, and reduces the present tax of 2 cents per pound on oleomargarine to one-quarter of I cent a pound in its uncolored form. Proctor, chairman of the committee on agriculture, made the opening statement in support of the measure.

From Bariboo, Wis., Jacob Steinman, who was taken to Waukegan Saturday for burglary, confessed that he was an anarchist and was present at the lodge meeting when Cgolgosz was selected to assassinate President McKinley, and that he was the person who tied the handkerchief over the hand of Czolgosz just before the shooting. He further said that a well-known woman was one of the principal instigators of the crime.

Too Large a Wheat Crop.

Duluth, March 26,-Apparently Manitoba and Assiniboia are suffering from too large a crop of wheat. So much grain was raised in these provinces last fall that there is no way of getting it to market, and no possibility of storing it in terminal elevators. The farmers and grain buyers of the provinces have applied to Minneapolis and Duluth for assistance, and their surplus wheat is now coming into this state at the rate of hundreds of cars a day.
