THE AFTERNOON SESSION.

Committees Ready Promptly to Report at 1:30 O'clock.

Colonel Raley called the convention to order for the afternoon session promptly at 1:30, the time named for reassembling. It was a business-like affair, prompt and rapid in transaction of its items of procedure.

Credentials Report. James W. Maloney, chairman of the credentials committee, was on his feet on the instant when called upon for a report, and read it to the delegates. It was adopted by unanimous vote.

The Platform Committee's Report. Colonel Boyd was equally prompt in answering the call for the platform committee's report, reading it to the convention. The reference to the initiative and referendum brought forth a round of vigorous applause, as did the clause referring to the complaints of a portion of the county republican party, applause and laughter following its reading. Judge Hartman moved its adoption, which was also unanimous.

The Order of Business. D. B. Watson, chairman of the order of business committee, was just as promptly ready to report. He read it which provided that the temporary officers be made permanent, and that the order of business be, election of 12 state delegates, nomination of senator, two representatives, sheriff, clerk, recorder, treasurer, commissioner, assessor, surveyor, coroner, and then justices and constables and central committeemen by precincts.

The report was signed by the committee, and adopted.

The State Delegate Election. Colonel Boyd desired that alternates be elected also, and there was much discussion which ended in Judge Hartman raising the point of order that there was no provision in the call of the convention for naming alternates, which point was sustained by the chair, whereupon the delegates began marking their ballots.

The tellers were V. H. Chastain, A. W. Nye, George P. Skelton, J. H. Price, Walter McCormack, Jerry Stone, James Means. The vote was counted, the 12 elected being Matlock, Stillman, Scott, Lienallen, Watson, Chapman, Nelson, Skelton, Boyd, Toner, Dillon, Powers.

C. H. Carter's name had been withdrawn before the voting began.

Dr. Smith for Senator. D. B. Watson arose to nominate Dr. C. J. Smith, which he did in a speech of a few sentences, the nomination being made by acclamation.

Representatives—Blakley and Reser. W. M. Blakley and E. A. Reser were nominated for representatives by acclamation.

T. D. Taylor for Sheriff. The nomination of T. D. Taylor for sheriff was by acclamation.

W. D. Chamberlain for Clerk. Nomination of W. D. Chamberlain for clerk to succeed himself, was by acclamation.

C. W. Marsh for Recorder.

C. W. Marsh, W. H. Fowler and R. B. Stanfield were named for recorder. Before a ballot could be taken W. H. Fowler withdrew his name in interest of harmony and a telegram was received withdrawing Stanfield's name. Mr. Stanfield not desiring to be a candidate, Mr. Marsh was thereupon nominated by acclamation.

W. D. Hansford for Treasurer.

W. D. Hansford, of Pendleton, G. R.

McGrew, of Weston, and G. P. Skelton, of Pilot Rock, were placed in nomination for treasurer. The vote stood: Hansford, 82; McGrew, 31; Skelton, 27. Mr. Hansford was declared the nominee.

James Nelson for Commissioner.

James Nelson, of Vinson, and E. B. Gambee, of Uklah, were placed in nomination for commissioner. The vote: Nelson, 122; Gambee, 21.

C. P. Strain for Assessor.

C. P. Strain, of Milton, and Scott Richie, of Milton, were placed in nomination for assessor. The vote was: Strain, 112; Richie, 36.

J. A. Howard, Surveyor.

J. A. Howard and Roy Conklin, were placed in nomination for surveyor. Mr. Conklin withdrew and Mr. Howard was named by acclamation.

Dr. T. M. Henderson for Coroner. Dr. T. M. Henderson, of Pendleton, was nominated by acclamation for coroner.

IRRIGATION UNION.

Articles of Incorporation Filed at the Court House.

Articles of incorporation of the Little Walla Walla River Irrigation Union, was filed with the county clerk at the court house Friday afternoon. The incorporators are J. C. Pritchard, G. A. Hobbs and F. E. Williams. The purpose of the corporation is to purchase, lease, manage, regulate, control the water rights, irrigation and systems now existing and put in dams, reservoirs, canals, ditches, flumes, pipes, etc., and other purposes, such as controlling the water of the Little Walla Walla river and irrigating the land tributary thereto. The principal office of the company is to be at Freewater and the duration and life is to be perpetual. It is capitalized with a stock of \$2000, divided into 2000 shares, at a par value of \$1 each.
