The Resolutions.

We, your committee on platform, beg
 to submit for your consideration the
 following county platform:

We reaffirm the time honored prin-
 ciples of the democratic party.

We favor the adoption of a consti-
 tutional amendment providing for
 and establishing the initiative and refer-
 endum system of law making.

We demand from the national gov-
 ernment such legislation as will ef-
 fectually protect our laboring classes
 from competition with Chinese and
 Japanese laborers; and that will pre-
 vent labor immigration from Asia.

We demand that the tariff shall be
 levied only for the purpose of raising
 revenue and be so adjusted that it
 cannot be the support and succor of
 monopoly and a sustaining arm for
 the trusts.

We denounce the ship subsidy as
 another method of despoiling the peo-
 ple to enrich the few; and as having
 in view of the erection of another
 gigantic trust to prey on their sub-
 stance and to control the legislation
 of the country.

We denounce the policy of the re-
 publican party in fostering trusts and
 ignoring the vital interests of the
 masses; the result of which must in-
 evitably be to revolutionize our sys-
 tem of government and make of this
 government a government of the
 trusts, by the trusts, and for the
 trusts, instead of a government of the
 people, by the people and for the
 people, and which tends to the cor-
 ruption and imperialism.

We point with pride to the efforts
 of the present democratic officers to
 reduce the expenses of administrat-
 ing our county affairs, and we favor
 the most rigid economy in the admini-
 stration of municipal, county, state
 and national affairs.

We pledge our senators and repre-
 sentatives in the legislature to do all
 in their power to secure the placing
 of all state officers upon salaries, and
 the payment into the state treasury
 of all fees received from any source.

We favor the election of United
 States senators by direct vote of the
 people.

We favor the enactment of a law
 by which the assessment of real
 property shall be made only once in
 three years instead of every year as
 now.

Whereas, it is claimed by some of
 the regular republicans of Umatilla
 county, who have stood so long by
 their party, and are now set aside,
 that the republican party in this
 county is dominated by a political
 machine operated by a boss, in the
 person of a renegade democrat, and

whom they are not recognised, and
 are not permitted to participate in
 the councils of their party, and there-
 fore, the republican party, as such,
 has no county ticket and is absolved
 from the support of the machine
 ticket; it is apparent that it is the
 duty of all true republicans to re-
 buke the methods they thus condemn,
 and we therefore invite them to sup-
 port the ticket today nominated by
 this convention, as the only means
 they have of accomplishing this end
 and purifying their party.

We feel that we can confidently ap-
 peal to all classes of voters, that val-
 ue their rights and interests as citi-
 zens of a free country to come to the
 support of the principles we advocate
 and vote with us.

Resolved, That, whereas the tariff
 upon sacks imported from foreign
 countries increases their cost to the
 raisers of wheat and the growers of
 wool to the extent of from two to
 five cents per sack, by enabling com-
 binations to control all sack import-
 ations, for their own benefit alone, and
 which has proven a heavy burden to
 the producers, especially of the Pac-
 fic Coast States, and protects no in-
 dustry, we demand the absolute repeal
 of all duties upon the same.

Political Notes.

C. W. Fulton was nominated by the
 republicans of Clatsop county Friday
 for state senator. He is also a can-
 didate for the United States senate
 to succeed Joe Simon.

Portland democrats are casting
 about for a candidate for mayor. The
 timber from which they will choose
 is Robert D. Inman, E. C. Robertson
 and John Lamont, for starters, with
 several dark horses, such as ex-Gov-
 ernor Sylvester Pennoyer, Dr. Wells
 and Dr. John Welch—and there are
 others.

The Simon forces in Portland are
 in a bad mood. They are back of a
 movement for the formation of a non-
 partizan citizens' ticket of city and
 county officers, to be voted for at the
 June election. As the situation now
 stands there is no doubt that such a
 ticket will be named.

The democratic convention for
 Crook county, at Prineville, Thurs-
 day, some strong resolutions were
 adopted in opposition to the leading
 of the public ranges. A resolution
 for the grazing of cattle on the for-
 est reserve in the county was adopt-
 ed.

The convention also went an record
 as favoring drastic Chinese exclusion
 laws.
