It is readily seen by the way Col. Judson talks about the sale that he expects a large crowd and the Commercial Association will make all the necessary arrangements to entertain all that come here for the occasion.

PENDLETON IS TO HAVE FREE MAIL DELIVERY JULY 1

Now for free delivery!

You need not wonder any more what has become of the proposition to give Pendleton a free mail delivery system.

The postmaster general has this day issued an order for the establishment of the free delivery service at your office on July 1, 1902, with two carriers and one substitute.

The civil service commission has been requested to take the necessary steps to organize the civil service board at your office, for the examination of applicants for the position of letter carriers.

Assistant Superintendent J. W. Erwin will visit Pendleton prior to July 1st, and assist you in laying out the carrier routes and locating the street letter boxes.

In fixing the boundaries of the free delivery district you will bear in mind that it is not the intention of the department to extend the free delivery service to outlying, sparsely settled portions of the town.

Letter boxes, postal straps and satchels have been ordered of the contractors. A day or two before the service is to be inaugurated you will have the boxes located.

The carriers and substitute carriers are required to give bond in the sum of \$1000 and the department prefers that it be furnished by one of the indemnity companies which have complied with the act of congress, approved August 13, 1894, a list of which is herewith enclosed.

Mr. Erwin will assist you in arranging a schedule for your carriers, and after the service is fully established and you have made such changes as you find necessary you will submit a copy to this office for approval.

RAY ROBBINS DIED THIS MORNING IN ARIZONA.

Was 17 Years Old and Was a Pendleton School Boy.

Ray Robbins, brother of George K. Robbins, proprietor of the "Owl Tea House," is dead.

Mr. Robbins received a telegram today from T. P. Page, who is at Phoenix, Ariz., stating that his brother died there this morning.

Ray Robbins was only 17 years of age and will be remembered by most of the young people of Pendleton, where he grew up and attended school. He was a favorite among the young people and was an athlete until a year ago this winter, when he contracted la grippe. He never fully recovered from this, and early last fall was sent to Arizona in the hopes of regaining his health, but this did not stay the dread hand of death that had fastened upon him in the form of tuberculosis, and which was the cause of his death.
