### GENERAL NEWS.

Colonel Robert C. Clowry has left Chicago for New York to assume the duties of his new office as president and general manager of the Western Union Telegraph Company.

Private advices from members of Tolstoi's immediate family say that the philosopher seems to be too much weakened by his late illness to regain even a shadow of his former health and strength.

Because a number of boys made remarks about the Easter hats worn by two girls who were accompanied by two young men, George Stranz, 16 years old, and Stanley Goblinski, 18 years old, were mortally wounded by one of the men in Chicago.

It is proposed that the gun-carriage which bore the name "Long Cecil" during the siege of Kimberley, and which will convey the body up the steep side of Matoppo, shall be stationed on the top of the hill as part of the memorial to Cecil Rhodes.

Albert T. Patrick, convicted in New York last week of murder in the first degree for plotting the death of Millionaire William Marsh Rice, and now awaiting the death sentence, and Mrs. Addie L. Francis have become husband and wife in the matron's room of the Toombs.

Upon the consideration of the sundry civil bill, Cannon, chairman of the appropriation committee, who was in charge of the measure, in a brief preliminary statement, explained that the bill carried \$49,323,895, being \$12,445,542 less than the estimates, and \$12,572,012 less than the current law.

Senator Mark Hanna has inaugurated his campaign for the presidential nomination by giving a dinner to the Gridiron Club. This organization, representative of the correspondents in Washington, is disposed to take up and push along the good thing. Long experience as head of the national campaign committee has taught Senator Hanna the advantage of having the newspaper men with him.

### PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS

M. S. Meeks has been selected by the Northern Pacific Railway company to succeed G. A. Graham as agent of North Yakima. Mr. Meeks is the oldest agent in the employ of the road between Spokane and the Coast.

Portland prohibitionists go into the local campaign with a full county and city ticket. At a mass meeting held Saturday night in the A. O. U. W. hall, a list of names was selected with which to keep the party before the public.

The surveyors for the Lyle & Goldendale Railroad are now working in the swale canyon, about 20 miles west of Goldendale. The company will at an early date receive bids for furnishing ties. It is also expected that grading will be commenced within 30 days.

About \$50,000 worth of sealions were seized in Seattle by local United States customs officials. The capture was made by Inspector W. P. Learned and J. S. Latimer. They found the skins aboard the schooner J. B. Ward, which arrived some days ago from Unalaska.

The Irvington track, near Portland, has been plowed and will be ready for grading at once. In the course of a couple of weeks it will be in good condition and the Northwestern horses will be given an opportunity to show what they can do against Helman's California string in track trials.

It is understood the Portland Chamber of Commerce will favor interesting the boards of trade and chambers of commerce all over the Northwest in a proposition to float bonds in the interest of The Dalles portage road. It will take several hundred thousand dollars to put the road in operation.

## THE NEARBY TOWNS

### FROST HAS DAMAGED MUCH OF THE FRUIT

Apricots and Peaches are Said to Have Been Killed.

Walla Walla, April 1.—Considerable damage to fruit is reported from different parts of the county, caused by the recent cold snap and sharp frosts which have visited the valley. Friday morning of last week and again Sunday morning frosts were reported in different sections, ice forming to the thickness of half an inch. Yesterday morning the cold was quite severe and frost did some damage. It is said that early budding trees have been injured and apricots and early peaches have been killed entirely. All delicate blossoms which have been advanced by the sunshine have been injured to some extent. From Snake river comes word that many of the trees were well advanced and it is feared much damage has been done. It will be several days before the real facts are known.

### Soldier Boys Were Discharged.

Walla Walla, April 1.—Today 19 members of the 10th battery stationed at Fort Walla Walla were discharged from further service, the term of enlistment having expired. Each of the men went East and will discontinue army life. This leaves but seven members in the battery and an effort is being made to secure men to fill up the vacant places. The 10th battery was composed of Eastern men who served in China and were at the fight at Pekin when the walls were scaled and entrance gained to the Sacred City. The captain of the battery, Captain Reilly, was killed at the battle, and fell within the walls of the city. The men were sent here and have been stationed at Fort Walla Walla for several months.

### End of Anti-Saloon Crusade.

Walla Walla, April 1.—Next Monday morning the April term of the superior court will convene for the trial of jury causes. A very light docket will be called, only one or two criminal cases of importance being ready for trial. N. R. Norman, charged with operating a saloon without a license, will likely be tried. This is the last of the saloon cases which have originated since the crusade against Sunday opening began some months ago.

### Some Beef Was Shipped.

Walla Walla, April 1.—Eight cars of beef cattle were shipped from this city yesterday in a special train for Seattle, having been purchased by the Frye-Bruhn company through John Kennedy. The stock was hard fed and consisted of steers averaging about 1500 pounds in weight. They were gathered from farmers near this city, and the top market price was realized.

### New Normal School Instructor.

Weston, April 1.—Dr. Beattie, president of the Normal School, has secured the services of Miss Lulu Spangler, of Corvallis, Or., for the vocal culture and elocution department, in the place of Miss Catherine LeBarre, resigned. L. C. Preston returned Saturday from a four weeks' visit at Pomona, Cal. His son Will, who has been spending the winter in Southern California for his health, returned with his father.

Sim J. Culley returned yesterday from a short visit at Walla Walla. Professor B. B. Smith and family have been spending several days at College Place with Mr. Smith's parents, who have lately moved to that place from Nebraska.

Dr. J. A. Best left for Portland yesterday to attend the state convention of the republican party. He will be gone four or five days.

Dr. J. C. Mack, of Walla Walla, is here looking after Dr. Best's business during his absence.

### BARMAIDS MUST GO. Calcutta Experiences a Reform That Causes Agitation.

Calcutta, April 1.—Calcutta is threatened with the loss of its barmaids, and no small portion of the community violently resents it. An order has recently been issued by the government of Bengal placing a clause in the licenses of all hotel proprietors, absolutely prohibiting the employment of women in any capacity in or about the bar. This prohibition took effect from today and a number of women were thrown out of employment. The result is a widespread agitation.

The number of barmaids in Calcutta has considerably increased in recent years. In the majority of cases they were brought out from England by the hotel and bar proprietors under contract for a term of years, generally three. The loss to them of a means of livelihood is to be deplored, but as they are entitled to passage back to England it does not entail the hardship that the more violent among the agitators predict. The local press claim that their sympathizers are numerous.

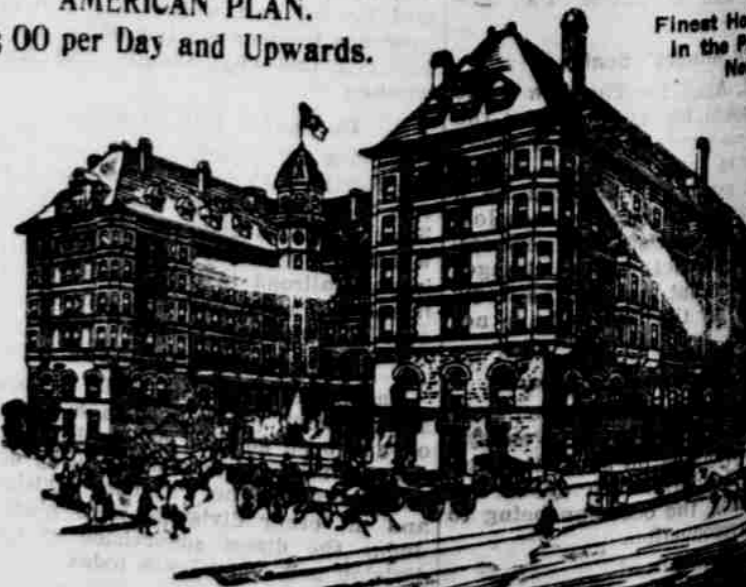
