TO THUNDER MOUNTAIN

People Leaving Weiser Every Day-Rush Will be Heavy and Already is Begun-Excitement Intense.

Weiser, Idaho, April 2.-Charles Campbell, of Walla Walla, left yesterday morning for the Thunder Mountain, intending to go through to the big camp alone. He took along his famous Husky dog, and will make the trip with the help of that animal. Campbell is but one of many others passing along the trail between Welser and Thunder Mountain. Tomorrow morning, John E. Thompson, formerly of Pendleton, leaves with a pack train bound for the camp. He recently came out from the mountain, having made the journey in and out. He reports seeing men en route at various points on the trail, and that numerous parties are now going in with horses and supplies. Supplies, however, in the camp itself are scarce and no one is permitted to remain who does not bring plenty of grub to furnish all his own needs.

Thompson was in Boise while outside, and says there are many people in that town awaiting the opening of the Boise trail which will not be accessible for several weeks to come. The travel is all via the Weiser routewhich is the only one now available for the stampeders. The route via Grangeville is not open, and is diffic..lt even for snow shoers, while the route from Boise crosses seven mountain ridges and is in some respects perilous, as it will be for a


