Americans Monopolizing Attention.
 London, March 31.—Britishers are beginning to wonder where the American invasion is to end. With players from across the water filling the leading theaters, with the transportation system of the metropolis in the hand of Americans and of more recent date, the tobacco trade of all England passing into the control of American companies, it is not surprising that American enterprise is the all absorbing topic of discussion. In no field of human activity, however, is the prominence of Americans more pronounced just now than in the world of sport. American pugilists of no great prominence at home have come to England and vanquished the top notchers with very little difficulty. In the recent boat race between Oxford and Cambridge two of the oarsmen were from across the water. And now the latest American product to attract attention is Jack Carneek, the wrestler, who for several weeks has been defeating all comers at the Alhambra.

Chicago Players Report.
 Chicago, March 31.—The players of the Chicago National League club have been ordered to report at Champaign today to get in early work preparatory for the opening of the season. The players will put in several weeks practicing with the University of Illinois team and other organizations and at the end of the period Manager Hart hopes to have the club in fine trim for the opening of the league season.

Essay on Army Reorganization.
 Washington, March 31.—The time limit for submitting the essays on "The most practical organization of the United States Army in active service," in competition for the Enno Sander prize of the society of Military Surgeons, expired today. There is much interest in the subject, and the announcement of the prize-winning essay is eagerly awaited.

Railroad Ties for Mexico.
 Duluth, Minn., March 31.—Half a million railroad ties are being sent from the shores of Lake Michigan into Mexico, the longest land shipment of such material ever made. They are consigned to the Mexican Central railroad for use in the central part of Mexico. The shipment of ties in such large quantities practically marks the opening of a new industry for the section.

Kansas City, Mo., April 1.—The second day's program of the Great American handicap tournament opened this morning with a largely increased number of participants. The features of the day is the Nitro Powder handicap at sixteen birds, with handicaps twenty-five to thirty-three yards.

GERMAN MUSIC TEMPLE.

Dedication of New Royal High School of Music and Art.
 Charlottenburg, Germany, April 1.—The new building of the Royal High School for Music and Art was dedicated today. Many of America's noted musicians studied at this institution under Joseph Joachim, Germany's greatest master. This monumental structure, erected out of sandstone, is built in baroque style and is crowned in the middle by a beautiful watchtower. The inscription on the building is as follows: "Artes fundamentum naturae"—the foundation of art is nature. Three entrances lead to a magnificent hall. Over the main portal is seen a large shield entwined with leaves of oak bearing the portrait relief of Kaiser Wilhelm II. protected by two mighty eagles.
 This new building was made necessary owing to the great increase of musical students, especially of those from America.
