Norfolk, Neb., April 2.—Several hundred teachers are here attending the sixteenth annual meeting of the North Nebraska Teachers' association.

Every town and village in northern Nebraska is represented, and it is said to be the largest meeting in the history of the association. At the opening session, held in the new auditorium this afternoon, the following subjects were discussed: Chemistry in daily life; the educational value of music; the teaching of agriculture in the public schools; the practical value of drawing and the value of pictures as an aid to language work. The convention will be in session until Saturday.

The bridesmaids were Miss Isabella Martin, Miss Gray, Miss Sylvia Fleming, Miss Florence Messner and Miss Dodge of Peoria.

River Commissioners Meet.

St. Louis, April 2.—The Mississippi river commissioners assembled here today and began their regular spring meeting. The members of the commission are Col. Amos Stickney, Major B. M. Harrod, R. S. Taylor, J. A. Ockerscu, H. S. Marinden and Major Thomas Casey. At the conclusion of the meeting the commission will make a trip of inspection down the Mississippi river to New Orleans.

Secretary State Board of Trade.

Nashville, Tenn., April 2.—The most important business before the semi-annual meeting of the State Board of Health here today is the selection of a successor to Dr. James A. Albright, secretary of the board. Dr. Albright is a candidate to succeed himself, and his friends are confident that he will be unanimously elected, notwithstanding that there are several other aspirants for the position.

New York M. E. Conference.

New York, April 2.—The New York conference of the Methodist Episcopal church began its annual session today in Grace Church with Bishop Fowler of Chicago presiding. The session of the conference will continue one week, and at its close about 300 pastors will be assigned to work. Rumor has it that many changes will be made.

Makes a Good Showing.

Grand Rapids, Mich., April 2.—At the annual meeting today of the Grand Rapids and Indiana railroad reports were presented showing the total gross earnings for the year amounted to \$3,654,725.31 as compared with \$3,397,182.36 last year, an increase of \$278,542.95. During the year dividends to the amount of \$115,020 were paid.

Encampment of Service Men.

Springfield, Ill., April 2.—Many states are represented by delegates at the annual encampment of the service men of the Spanish war, which opened today in this city. The gathering will continue till Friday. Addresses are to be delivered by a number of men who took prominent parts in the Spanish-American war, and a permanent organization will be effected.

TO REIMBURSE SETTLERS.

Those Who Took Up Certain Lands to Get Back \$1.25 Per Acre.

The house committee on public lands has authorized Representative Moody to make a favorable report on his double minimum land bill, which is identical with the Mitchell bill reported by the senate committee. This bill, which provides for refunding \$1.25 an acre to those settlers located on lands included within grants along unconstructed portions of the Northern Pacific, inferentially carries an appropriation of approximately \$1,500,000. The great bulk of settlers who would be benefited by its passage are located on lands between Wallula and Portland, on both sides of the Columbia. Representative Brudrige, a member of the committee, will, as in past congresses, file a minority report on the bill, although the measure has the endorsement of the republicans on the committee.

Cause of Leprosy.

Dr. Jonathan Hutchinson, formerly president of the Royal College of Surgeons, who recently returned to England after studying the causes of leprosy in South Africa, has arrived at the conclusion that the primary cause of the disease is the use as food, of badly cured salt fish, which is sent inland from Cape Town and elsewhere on the west and south coasts, and is largely consumed by the farmers in the industrial centers.
