TRIALS OF A POSTMASTER.

Letter of a Pilot Rock Man to the Waitsburg Official.

There is a man living at Pilot Rock who wants to find a family, who he says, lives in the neighborhood of Waitsburg. In Walla Walla county, and this is the kind of a letter he wrote the Waitsburg postmaster asking him to help to locate them:

"Dear Sir: Would you be so kind as to inform me of a family who I believe are living about nine miles from Waitsburg. There is a telephone running from Waitsburg to their place. That is all the description I can give of them, except that the man is married and has stock on his place. Please oblige yours truly.

"P. S.—He is an Illinois man, and I think his wife's sister is living with them. I think he has some sheep. His wife's brother went to them a month ago."

"These," said Mr. Dickinson plaintively today, "are some of the trials of a postmaster."

He has forgotten the name and wrote A. S. Dickinson, Waitsburg postmaster the above description, thinking that from it he would be able to pick out the right man from the many patrons of his postoffice. The letter is so clear in its description that Mr. Dickinson thinks he will have no trouble in finding the lost friend for the Oregon man and as soon as he is located the fact will be wired to Pilot Rock at once.

TRANSMITTING POWER.

The Snoqualmie Falls Plant as an Experiment.

The Snoqualmie Falls plant has been made the subject of some interesting experiments. The transmission lines to Seattle and Tacoma, which are double, were so connected that the current passed from the falls to Seattle, back to the falls, to Tacoma and then back to the falls again, making a total distance of 153 miles. The line was found to have a resistance of 241 ohms, and the resistance of the insulation from the wire to the ground was 7,000 ohms. One of the 1500 KW. generators furnishes the current sent over this circuit, and a similar machine was used as a synchronous motor at the receiving end. It was found possible to transmit a large amount of energy in this way with a loss of approximately only 13 1/2 per cent. Tests made on an open circuit to determine the charging current showed that the latter required in the generators a capacity of 112 KW.—Geo. H. Gibson, in the Engineering Magazine for April.

Too Much Drink.

As a result of too much "booze," four men were up before Police Judge McCourt this morning. They all pleaded guilty, and one, Ed Whittier, who claimed to be a sheep herder, from Heppner, was released. Robert Morrow, a carpenter, who has been begging on the streets, and drunk, was sent to jail until his story of having work with the O. R. & N. company could be investigated, and his chum, A. E. Dickson, was sent to jail for two days and a half in default of the money to pay a fine of \$5. The other man was an Indian. He said his name was Dan Hadley and he was fined \$5 and costs, amounting to \$7.50 and went to jail in default.

Schalkburger is Treating With President Steyn.
Pretoria, April 3.—Acting President Schalkburger, who, with the other prominent Boers recently passed through the British lines for the purpose of discussing peace with the Boer leaders in the field, has succeeded in opening negotiations with President Steyn, of the Orange Free State.

Chance for Suspension of the Entire Brewing Industry.
Boston, April 3.—The brewery workers of Boston went on a strike this morning. General teamsters may also become involved. This means there will be entire suspension of brewing beer in 24 Boston breweries so far as union workmen are concerned.

Respect for Altgeld.

Louisville, Ky., April 3.—A unique tribute was paid to the memory of John P. Altgeld at today's session of the allied parties convention. After resolutions of regret were adopted, the convention arose and remained standing in silence for 30 seconds.

The usual Sunday bull fight at Juarez, Mexico, was accompanied by a somewhat unusual feature, the goaded animal turning the tables on the matadore.

MAZAMAS AT MT. ADAMS.

They Will Leave Portland on July 15 for White Salmon.

Conforming with the wishes of the majority, the ninth annual outing of the Mazamas will be made to Mount Adams, Washington. Leaving Portland for White Salmon on the morning of July 15, 1902, the following day to Trout Lake where permanent quarters will be established during the stay, which will be from the 15th to the 26th of July, inclusive. Trout Lake, aside from being remarkably beautiful and enchanting is one of the most ideal and attractive campgrounds in the Cascade range. A spot full of "dreamy splendor" where the atmosphere is redolent with the perfume of wild flowers. The clear, cold water, the gamest trout, the most colossal sculpturing in nature, may be seen from its shores; while in the immediate vicinity are many lava and ice caves, distinctive and unique in themselves, and to which side trips will be made during the encampment.

Mount Adams is one of the giants of our Cordilleran region, rising 12,400 feet above the Pacific ocean. A diadem of snow, diverging and transforming into crevasse and glacial cascade. The customary camp-fire lecture and mountain lore will be rigidly observed as a part of the outing program. We expect to have with us many scientists from abroad and elsewhere. The expenses of the trip will be nominal. An itinerary will be issued later.
