GENERAL NEWS

The Marconi Wireless Telegraph Company has sold its American rights and patents to an American company with a capital of \$5,500,000.

Subscriptions to the Russian loan were closed in Berlin. The loan was oversubscribed 100 times. The majority of the subscriptions were from Germans.

The rejection of Crozier by the senate committee on military affairs today will possibly prevent the selection of very young men for the high places of command in the army, as Crozier was a captain when he was made a brigadier general, and he jumped over about 40 men.

Ellen M. Stone, the American missionary, according to the Tribune's London correspondent, has definitely not to deliver a lecture in this country, as her voice will not stand the strain of public speaking just yet. She will sail from Liverpool for New York on Saturday. Her injured knee still gives her trouble.

Concerning the Oregon nominations, Representative Moody said: "I regret that Governor Geer was not renominate. He is an old-line republican of exceptional ability. He made a vigorous and most successful campaign four years ago, carrying the party to victory when there was imminent danger of defeat."

Tomas Estrada Palma, President-elect of the Cuban republic, addressed the New York chamber of commerce today. Mr. Palma, who was introduced by Morris K. Jessup, president of the chamber, said that in his judgment, commerce is the most important wheel in the complex mechanism of a political body.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS

There are strong indications that Surveyor-General Perrault, of Idaho, will soon be reappointed for another term of four years. He has practically cleared up the charges that he has violated the civil service laws in several respects.

Senator Foster introduced an amendment to the sundry civil bill, appropriating \$25,000 for improving Mount Ranier National Park, and authorizing the secretary of war to detail troops to protect the park from injury by trespassers and for the protection of game.

Senator Simon has paired in favor of the oleomargarine bill. He telegraphed Senator Hansborough so as to pair him before the time for voting began. While Senator Turner voted to recommit the bill, he was paired for it on the final passage with Warren, of Wyoming, who was opposed to the bill.

The 4-year-old child of W. Tillman, of The Dalles was shockingly scalded last evening by falling into a tub of hot water. The tub had been set on the kitchen floor by a servant. Entering the room unnoticed, the little girl backed against the tub and fell in. Small hopes are entertained for her recovery.

The G. A. R. of Eugene has decided to erect a monument to the memory of the veterans of the civil war, and has sent for proposals. The monument will cost not less than \$15,000. It is the intention to place a statue of either marble or metal, not less than 15 or 20 feet high, in one of the parks in front of the county court house.

Senator Foster was assured by members of the house committee on naval affairs, who are preparing the naval appropriation bill, that the new yard at Bremerton is being well taken care of in the bill, and that the appropriation for it will fit it up in such shape that a very large share of the naval ships on the Pacific can be repaired there.
