At Pilot Rock.

The River is Rising.

The Umatilla river is rising very fast as a result of the wind which started the snow to melting in the mountains. Sunday evening it was quite cool for a while just before dark, but about 10 o'clock it began to warm up and by the time the electrical storm began it was almost like a summer night and people were sleeping with wide open windows.

WINCHESTEA TRAIN WRECK

Spokane, April 7.—The train that left Seattle last night, ran into a freight car that was blown off the siding at Winchester. There is no telegraph at the scene of the wreck. Details are meager. One report says that the engine and seven cars left the track. Another says only the engine, mail and baggage cars were wrecked. The fireman was the only one hurt. A special train with doctors left this city this morning. The wreck will delay traffic for 15 hours. The officials refuse information.

FELL AND DODSON MINES.

Alaska Properties Have Been Financed and Will Be Developed.

Theron E. Fell and son returned home on Sunday night's train. Mr. Fell, John Dodson, Walter Fell and Arthur Babb expect soon to leave for Alaska, taking in a large quantity of machinery to work the placer mines on Mastodon creek, they own. They have effected highly satisfactory financial arrangements for the proper development of their properties, having succeeded in interesting men of strong position in the business life of Portland.

The task of taking in the machinery is considerable. It must be shipped this year down the Yukon river to Circle City, there to remain until next winter, when it will be transported over the ice and snow to Mastodon creek. Hence it will be a year from the present summer when it will be in operation.

The prospect for their mines is excellent. A large number of valuable claims a mile long in all have been secured by purchase and location, and the gold in them is demonstrated to be enormous in quantity, and easily to be extracted from the soil.

STEPTOE BUTTE TO BE SOLD.

Historic Landmark to Be Put Up by the Sheriff.

Steptoe Butte, the most notable and historic landmark in Eastern Washington, is to be sold at sheriff's sale Saturday, April 26, to satisfy a mortgage of \$1791.57, and \$2200 attorneys' fees, held by the Canadian & American Mortgage Company, of London, England, says a Colfax dispatch.

This butte, which was the scene of Colonel Steptoe's famous fight with Indians in 1857, stands 3800 feet above the sea level and towers 2000 feet above the surrounding country.

The land included in the butte from its huge base to the peak, contains about 2000 acres, but only 160 acres which includes the top with its hotel and barn, will be sold. The hotel is two stories high and has an observatory on the roof from which the finest view of Washington, Idaho and Oregon can be obtained with the aid of a powerful field glass. The mountains of Western Washington and Oregon can be plainly seen although more than 300 miles away, and the Palouse country lays before the observer like a huge panorama, 14 towns being in view from the observatory.

In early days this building and observatory were a source of great profit to "Cash-Up" Davis, who homesteaded the butte 25 years ago. Mr. Davis gave dances in the hotel, which had a fine, large floor, on which 50 couples often danced at one time, and the dances were attended by people from miles in every direction. On special occasions 100 couples frequently attended the balls. Mr. Davis died six years ago, since which time the place has been dismantled, and the hotel closed. It is hoped after the sale the hotel will be reopened and the place made a pleasure resort.

Road Machinery Reduces Cost.

New York state may be said to lead the others this year in road improvement interests, and the national conference upon road improvement held at the Pan-American exposition at Buffalo last summer helped to increase interest in the matter, says The Good Roads Magazine. The exhibition of machinery for road construction and repairing at Buffalo naturally illustrated in a forcible way modern methods of improving our public highways at the least possible expense. In awarding the contracts for road construction this year the attempt was made to keep the cost of road development to the very lowest possible point consistent with excellent work. It is estimated that some of the inland highways can be constructed at the rate of \$2,000 per mile, where a few years ago they would have cost between \$4,000 and \$7,000 per mile. This reduction is due to the cheaper cost of trap rock and the employment of machinery on the roads in place of so much hand labor.
