KIDS WON, 4 TO 3

LARGE HOLES WERE TORN IN ATHENA ATMOSPHERE

By Batmen, and the Game Abounded in Brilliant Plays—900 People on Athena Grounds on Sunday Afternoon.

Athens, April 7.—Ned Collins, Sharpstine's scorer, and Doc Osborn, his own, marked four tallies to the credit of the Yellow Kids, here Sunday afternoon, giving Walla Walla three. Nine hundred howling enthusiasts, interested, cold, shivering, baseball-mad specimens of the genus homo, who after the wind had sprinkled dust over them for two hours, through an 11-inning game, looked somewhat like 900 specimens of the genus hobo, watched the most brilliant exhibition of the popular craze that has been seen in this part of the solar system for many a day. It was horse and equine to the end of the tenth inning, and in the eleventh, Bradbury, of Walla Walla, pulled the map-drawers to record an error against him, said error costing the cabbage-raisers the game.

A special from the city of squash sales brought 247 natives, with 50 people picked up along the way. One from the town where Cohen's "Wonders" grew, had aboard 144 dust-eaters, and 40 who climbed aboard en route. Fifty or 60 rigs came from the country around, and the rest of the 900 yelled for the Yellow Kids as a home team.
