## BIRTHDAY OF A KING.

### Danes Celebrate Natal Day of Christian Today.

Copenhagen, April 8.—The 84th birthday of King Christian was celebrated today throughout Denmark. During the forenoon diplomats officials and other dignitaries called at the palace and tendered their congratulations. The streets of the capital were crowded and the square fronting the Amellenborg palace contained several thousand people who constantly cheered the king, who in response appeared on the balcony with his daughters. There was the usual family gathering in the palace in celebration of the anniversary. The party included the dowager empress of Russia, Queen Alexandria of England, the hereditary Grand Duke Michael, the Grand Duchess of Luxembourg, the Duke and Duchess of Cumberland, and Prince George of Hanover, and the Princesses Alexandra and Olga, the Landgravine of Hesse, Prince and Princess Max of Baden, and Prince Hans of Glucksburg.

## Sunday School Workers.

Gainesville, Fla., April 8.—Several hundred delegates and visitors are in the city attending the annual Florida State Sunday School convention. The reports of the various committees show great gains in the number of Sabbath schools and membership throughout the state. This morning fully 500 people assembled in the Kavanaugh Memorial church, where the main meeting was held. The meeting opened with a long service led by Professor E. O. Excell, of Chicago. The address of welcome was by Rev. W. J. Carpenter and the response by Dr. John F. Forbes, of De Land. The features of the session were addresses by Marlon Lawrence, general secretary of the International Sunday School Association, and Charles D. Meigs, of the International Evangel. The appointment of committees and other business of a routine nature occupied the remainder of the morning. The afternoon's program provides for papers, addresses and discussions on various phases of Sunday school work.

## Kansas City Voting Today.

Kansas City, April 8.—The election in Kansas City today is for a mayor and other municipal officials. The contest has been a fierce one with municipal ownership of lighting facilities, the enforcement of the terms of governing the franchises granted to public service corporations, and the improvements of the streets and the water system as the chief issues. Mayor James A. Reed is a candidate for re-election on the democratic ticket, and the republican nominee for mayor is John J. Green. Report from the various polling places indicate a heavy vote and the result is expected to be close.

## New Hospital Dedicated.

New Albany, Ind., April 8.—St. Edward's Hospital, which has been in progress of construction for more than a year past, was formally dedicated today with impressive ceremonies. The ceremonies were in charge of Bishop Chatard, of Indianapolis, assisted by the Rt. Rev. D. O'Donoghue, associate bishop, and other participants included prominent Catholic clergy from various Southern Indiana parishes.

## Steel Business Booming.

Birmingham, Ala., April 8.—The new furnace of the Republic Iron & Steel company is now in full blast. The furnace has the largest capacity of any in Alabama, and its output is expected to reach 300 tons a day. The company is preparing itself for an increased output of pig iron by increasing its capacity for supplying raw material.

## Automobile Savings Bank.

Paris, April 8.—French bankers seeking savings deposits have taken several steps in advance of the American banks which displayed their enterprise by distributing small boxes that can be opened only at the bank. A leading French banking firm has introduced the automobile savings bank which tours the country districts at state intervals and gathers in the savings of the thrifty peasants. An electric motor car has been built for this purpose. It provides seats for a cashier and two clerks, arranged about a revolving table. There are shelves on the walls for the bank books, and a strong box is built into the body of the car. The innovation has met with a most favorable reception.

## Kansas State Shoot.

Olathe, Kan., April 8.—The annual convention and tournament of the Kansas State Sportsman's association opened here today for a three days' session, with several score of crack shots from various parts of the state present. On the closing day live birds will be the feature, including two specially interesting contests. One will be the Great Western Handicap, and the other a 25-bird shoot for the wing shot championship of Kansas. Some excellent scores were made in the preliminary events today.

Memphis, Tenn., April 8.—This is the day of the Tennessee Derby. At Montgomery Park this morning the going was good and the ground never looked better. All of the candidates for the rich stake are ready for the race.
