## GUESTS ARE COMING

PREPARE TO WELCOME  
THEM WITH HOSPITALITY.

One Hundred and Fifty People Com-  
ing From Baker City—Five Hunder-  
ed Are Coming From Washington  
Points—Get to Work.

The window decorations for the  
great "Bunchgrass" Woodmen of the  
World conclave has already com-  
menced, and judging by the interest  
which the people of the city are man-  
ifesting, it is safe to predict that  
Pendleton has never presented the  
gala appearance which it will on this  
occasion. A generous rivalry is al-  
ready manifest among the merchants  
to outdo each other in their window  
displays. This is as it should be, and  
the same spirit should extend to the  
property holders and residents gen-  
erally throughout the city. Even as  
this promises to be the greatest event  
in the history of our city, so should  
our people rise to the occasion and  
make the most of it, both as a courtes-  
y to our guests and as an advertise-  
ment for the town. Some of the vis-  
itors are coming from as far as Col-  
orado, and the impression which they  
will carry home with them will do  
much to make or mar for the city in  
the future. Not only should the win-  
dows be dressed, but flags and bunt-  
ing should appear over the fronts of  
both business and residence houses.  
A carload of evergreens from  
Meacham is expected tonight, and its  
free use by the merchants will do  
much to enhance the beauty of the  
city.

### Best News Today.

The best news that can be reported  
today, is word that there will be 150  
people from Baker City alone. As  
previously announced there will be at  
least 500 from Washington, on special  
train Monday morning. It is hard  
to estimate just what the attendance  
will be from other cities, but it is cal-  
culated to run somewhere between a  
thousand and fifteen hundred. Add-  
ed to the three or four thousand who  
will be in attendance from through-  
out the country adjacent to Pendle-  
ton, and some idea of the crowds  
which will be here can be gleaned.

### Committees Working.

The sub-committees are holding  
daily sessions, and each is working  
in conjunction with the other. The  
elaborate program is being worked  
out in detail, and will be ready for the  
press in a day or two. It is being  
arranged to a nicety, and every hour  
is being provided for from 5 o'clock  
on Monday morning until 8 o'clock  
the following Wednesday.

The main events, however, will be  
the arrival of the special train at  
10:30 a. m. on Monday, the entertain-  
ment of the school children of the  
city in the Furnish warehouse at 1:30  
p. m. Monday, the street parade Mon-  
day evening, the Woodmen initiation  
Monday evening, and the grand ball  
in the Music hall Monday evening.

Tuesday will commence with an  
open air band concert at 10 a. m., fol-  
lowed by field games and sports till  
noon. Public entertainment by stereo-  
opticon in Furnish warehouse at 2 p.  
m., followed by open air concerts by  
three brass bands in different parts  
of the city.

Address of welcome by mayor and  
oration by Hon. S. A. Lowell, orator  
of the day. Fancy public military  
drills by various uniform ranks, in-  
itiation in the evening by the Women  
of Woodcraft and another grand ball  
in Music hall by the Woodmen of the  
World.

Interspersed through it all will be  
features which will keep it "a hot  
time in the old town" from start to  
finish.

### Williams Completes Tour.

J. S. Williams, who has been tour-  
ing the towns adjacent to and  
throughout the field embraced in the  
great gathering, returned yesterday,  
to confer with Mr. Rogers, and went  
on to Dayton this morning, from  
which point he will come with the  
special train. He is enthusiastic in  
his reports, and states that with but  
one or two exceptions, the neighbors  
and neighbors are coming en-  
masse. Mr. Williams has done great  
work in the interests of the jubilee  
and every citizen of Pendleton is  
under obligations to him.

### Entertainment Committee.

The entertainment committee de-  
serves special credit for the thorough  
manner in which it is listing all beds  
and rooms in the city. It is deter-  
mined that the visitors from afar shall  
be cared for even if our own people  
have to sit up. The committee is  
gratified at the response which it is  
receiving to its requests in this re-  
spect. Almost without exception,  
they have been promised rooms, even  
if owners had to give up their own  
beds, and at regular rates. Thus  
there will be no opportunity, even  
should there be any so disposed, to  
practice extortion on any of the city's  
guests. This universal spirit of hospi-  
tality augurs much not only for the  
success of this, but of future gather-  
ings to be held in this city.

In Honor of Miss Schiffer.  
Mrs. Frank O'Hara entertained  
Tuesday evening in honor of Miss Ad-  
eline Schiffer, who is here from Al-

bany visiting her father. The fea-  
tures of the evening's entertainment  
were music and games of different  
kinds, interspersed with dancing.  
After the gaieties of the evening were  
over and the young people were pre-  
paring to retire to their respective  
homes, Mrs. O'Hara set dainty re-  
freshments before her guests and all  
left feeling that they had spent one  
of the most enjoyable evening's of  
the social season in Pendleton. About  
20 were present.

### DEATH OF MRS. PROEBSTEL.

Wife of Senator George W. Proebstel  
Dies of Paralysis.

Weston, April 16.—Mrs. Mary Proeb-  
stel, wife of State Senator G. W.  
Proebstel, died at her home in Wes-  
ton last evening of paralysis. Mrs.  
Proebstel was born in Alsace-Lor-  
raine, Germany, in 1844, and came to  
this country in girlhood. In August,  
1865, she was married to G. W. Proeb-  
stel, at Vancouver, Wash. Mrs. Proeb-  
stel has been in poor health for sev-  
eral months and while her condition  
has caused much uneasiness on the  
part of the family, they were unpre-  
pared for the sudden change for the  
worse that took place yesterday, at 5  
o'clock. Mrs. Proebstel leaves a hus-  
band and eight children to mourn her  
loss. Five of the children, three  
sons and two daughters, reside in  
Weston, one son is in Lostine, Or.  
A married daughter, Mrs. Fredericks,  
lives in Philadelphia, and one daugh-  
ter, Miss Marguerite, is in Tacoma,  
being a trained nurse in the Fanny  
Paddock Memorial hospital.

Mrs. Proebstel had a host of friends  
in Weston and vicinity.

She took an active part in lodge  
and church work, holding member-  
ship in the Episcopal church, the  
Eastern Star, Degree of Honor and  
the Pioneer lodges.

Funeral services will be held  
Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock and  
the interment will be at the Weston  
cemetery.
