FOR KILLING SONG BIRDS.

The Three Japs Arrested on the Charge Fined \$15 and Costs.

"It is the verdict of this court that you each be fined \$15 and costs," said Judge Fitz Gerald this morning after hearing the evidence in the cases of Oista, Otea and Figt, the three Japs arrested at Meacham Monday, charged with the destruction of song birds.

These Japs are working on the railroad for the O. R. & N. company, and it seems that they have made a practice of killing robins and other harmless birds and eating them. They have been doing this for some time, but sufficient evidence could not be obtained to convict them until recently, when Game Warden T. B. Wells was informed that on Sunday, the 6th inst., they had been caught with birds in their cabin. This was the cause of their arrest and the evidence was so strong that they were fined \$15 each and costs, which amounts to \$30 each. This was paid and the Japs went their way, and will probably be more careful in the future about slaughtering birds contrary to law.

STOLE A GRIP.

Two Men Arrested for the Theft—One Released and the Other Held.

George Evans and Dave Armstrong, transients, who were arrested Tuesday for the theft of a grip from the waiting room of the O. R. & N. depot, the night before, were arraigned this forenoon before Judge Fitz Gerald. Armstrong was released, but Evans was held in \$250 bonds to appear at the next term of court, unless he chooses to plead guilty.

## TOUCHED FOR \$30

W. F. JAMES, OF IOWA, ROBBED AT PENDLETON DEPOT.

He Had Just Arrived on Train From Walla Walla and in the Crowd Was Robbed Without Knowing It.

W. F. James, an old G. A. R. man, was "touched" for \$30, his ticket to La Grande and trunk check at the O. R. & N. depot, Tuesday evening, as he was attempting to board the train for La Grande.

Mr. James is recently from Iowa and came west a few weeks ago to look over the country. He has been in Spokane and from there came to Walla Walla Tuesday, where he bought a ticket for La Grande. After buying his ticket he had \$30 in his pocketbook and placed his ticket and trunk check in the purse with the money. He arrived here on the 5:23 train from Walla Walla and got off the Walla Walla train to board the other for his destination. There was a large crowd getting on the train at the same time Mr. James was trying to get aboard, and the rest of the story is best told in his own language:

"I got off the train I came in on and crossed the platform to the other one. There was a large crowd and I had to push my way through them to get to the steps. Finally I got to the car and placed my foot on the steps to get aboard and some one caught hold of my coat and pulled me back. I paid no attention to that but finally managed to get on the platform between the coaches. This was jammed full of people and I had to edge and crowd through. I felt a pull at my pocket, but thought nothing of it until I got to my seat and threw my overcoat off my arm and started to sit down. Then I felt in my pocket and my purse was gone. It contained all my money and ticket, so I did not know what to do. However, I got off the train and spoke to a comrade, who took me to dinner with him and introduced me to others, who have treated me very nicely and I feel grateful to them.

Mr. James is apparently a man who tells a straight story. He is an Odd Fellow and a 33d degree Mason. The members of these orders have taken up the case and provided Mr. James with money to get to La Grande, where his trunk is.

The officers were notified of the loss, but there is no clew to the robber and it is not likely that he will be apprehended.
