Robert Burns phoned the East Oregonian this afternoon that the Walla Walla band would accompany the baseball enthusiasts to Pendleton tomorrow, and about 2:30 o'clock p. m., would give a street concert in front of the Hotel Pendleton.

Charles H. Horsman has filed suit at the court house against J. A. Horsman, Ida B. Horsman and Eugene Corley to collect \$910.75 alleged to be due on a promissory note. He also asks for \$125 attorneys' fees and costs of suit, beside 10 per cent interest on the principal. Stillman & Pierce are attorneys for plaintiff.

Wamsley, who is still in Portland, as follows: "Jesse won three silver cups and a gold medal in special prizes and she took prize for the best dog of any breed in the show." The management of the baseball grounds desire to have it understood that no teams or horses of any kind will be allowed to leave the enclosure of the grounds tomorrow until all of those on foot are out of the grounds and on the street. This action is taken to avoid the risk that has been run heretofore by allowing teams and pedestrians to pass through the gates at the same time after the game is over.

Overland train No. 1, due in Pendleton at 8 o'clock this morning, did not arrive until 2:30 this afternoon. It was held at Huntington awaiting the arrival of a special section loaded with home seekers which was several hours late. On this train were between 300 and 400 home seekers, most of them going to Portland, but quite a few changed cars here and took No. 8, which was held for No. 1, for Spokane.

Excelsior Council No. 194, Order of Pendo, gave a very successful entertainment Friday evening at Hendricks' hall. A burlesque upon the play, "The Sweet Family," as rendered by Mesdames Atherton, Hammond, Richmond and Van Paymbroech, Misses Stanton, Copeland, Smith and Reeves, was very amusing and brought down the house. A nice lunch followed by dancing, completed a very enjoyable evening.

Increased Telegraph Service.

The facilities of the Western Union Telegraph office, in this city, have just been improved by the addition of a new switch board. What's in a Name.

Krause, vice-president of the State Game and Fish Association, has received word that the consignment of brook trout that were coming to be placed in Meacham creek, will consist of 35,000 instead of 30,000, as was announced a few days ago. These fish will arrive Thursday and will immediately be released in the water near Meacham. The name of the trout is Salvelinus Fontinalis Umatillas Gebhardt's, and, if a name indicates anything, they should be able to hold their own with the raging waters of the Umatilla.
