**TAXING THE DOGS.**

Up to Date 165 Licenses Have Been Issued by Recorder.

One hundred and sixty-five dog licenses have been paid up to date. This is about one-fourth the amount that should have been paid into the city treasury, and if some people do not look out their canines will come up missing one of these days. The city officials are determined to have all that is due the city, if it is possible to get it, and the dog license is one of the things they are after, and unless the owners of these canines comply with the city ordinance they will feel the halter draw.

The marshal has given instructions to be a little lenient with citizens regarding dogs and the dog tax so far, but the license has now been due more than a month and those who have not paid have had plenty of time and have been warned, so that if their dog is run in by the dog catcher and impounded and it costs something to get him out, no blame can be attached to the officers.

It is estimated by the city officials that no less than 600 canines are allowed to run at large in the city of Pendleton, and if there is an ordinance imposing a tax on them every one should be treated alike and made to pay, or the law should be repealed. It is not right for 150 or 2200 people to pay this tax and let 300 or 400 more keep dogs without paying a cent.

**GENERAL NEWS**

Soaking rains fell in Kansas Thursday and Thursday night.

The new Chinese treaty will continue to allow flour to enter China free of duty.

Mrs. Mary Dellinger, aged 70 years, long a resident of Portland, died in that city Thursday night.

General J. A. Clarkson, of Iowa, has taken the oath of office of surveyor of customs of New York city.

The Cuban congress will convene May 5th by order of General Wood. May 20 will be Cuban independence day.

Berry Howard, the alleged principal in the assassination of Governor Goebel, was acquitted at Frankfort, Ky., Friday.

The Texas Pharmaceutical Association has decided to withdraw from the National Association of Retail Druggists. Various reasons were assigned, the principal one being a lack of sympathy between the objects of the two associations.

Governor-General Wood has issued an order pardoning W. R. Reeves who was recently sentenced to 10 years imprisonment and to pay a fine of \$35,616 for complicity in the Cuban postal frauds. Reeves was liberated at once. General Wood says he pardoned Reeves because he was a witness for the state.

At a meeting of railroad agents at Los Angeles all the lines agreed to the adoption of interchangeable mileage books to be used on all lines west of Colorado, except the Northern Pacific and Great Northern. These books are designed for the use of those who desire the mileage accommodations and at the same time have to use the various lines.

A practical joke terminated fatally for Edward L. Miller, a colored man, who was shot and killed by Joseph B. Brown, another colored man, who was a friend of his victim, in Chicago. Both men had lived in the same house, and as a joke, Miller attempted to hold Brown up on the street. Brown was arrested. Miller had no weapon and his hands were in his pockets.

**PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS**

Mrs. John Harrison, a resident of Washington county for 25 years, died at the home of John Ireland, at Greenville, aged 53 years.

Samuel Wilson, a carpenter, fell from a new house on which he was at work in Portland, a distance of 20 feet, tearing a hole under his arm, exposing the bone and muscles. He will recover.

Joseph Reno, on trial in the federal court for sending obscene letters through the mails to his sweetheart, Miss Lulu Mercler, was acquitted at Spokane, the jury deciding that he was insane.

Oregon salmon sells in the German markets at 35 cents a pound. The fish were frozen in Oregon and shipped in the frozen state to Europe. It is claimed that if thawed in cold water and then cooked the fish retains its flavor.

The grand jury of Steens county, Washington has returned two indictments against J. M. Bailey, prosecuting attorney of that county, charging him with perjury and illegal collection of fees. It is charged that Bailey used passes and also bought railroad tickets, charged them to the county, then sold them or gave them away.
