**VICTIM OF PHILIPPINES.**

A Young Man Who Was a Soldier, Tries to End His Life.  
Waitsburg, Wash., April 26.—Fred Wilkinson, a well-known young man of this city, and a veteran of the Spanish-American war, attempted suicide yesterday in a fit of despondency, and but for the prompt work of physicians his work would have proved successful. Wilkinson drew a razor across his throat, making a horrible wound but not causing immediate death.  
Wilkinson served with Company K, enlisted in this city for service in the Philippines, and returned with his company broken in health. Since his return he has not been strong and recently his condition became worse. This is thought to be the reason for his rash attempt to end his life. He has been making his home with his mother, who is 75 years of age, in this city, and the tragedy occurred at her home. Hopes are entertained for his recovery.

DIRECT NOMINATION LEAGUE.  
One Organized at Salem for the Purpose of Preparing a Bill.  
Salem, Or., April 26.—An amass meeting was held at Marion Square today at 2 o'clock and a Direct Nomination League formed for the purpose of preparing a bill to present to the legislature that shall apply at least to Marion county and possibly to others. Governor Geer presided and made a speech for the measure, as did Tilmon Ford, Judge Boise, N. J. Judah and candidates on both legislative tickets. A committee was named, including R. P. Boise, E. W. Bingham, W. T. Slater, R. M. Croisan and E. Hofer to draw the bill for a direct primary law at which both parties will hold their primary on the same day and at the same time before the same officers, and all laws on Australian ballot to apply to the primary. Primary day is also to be the first registration day.

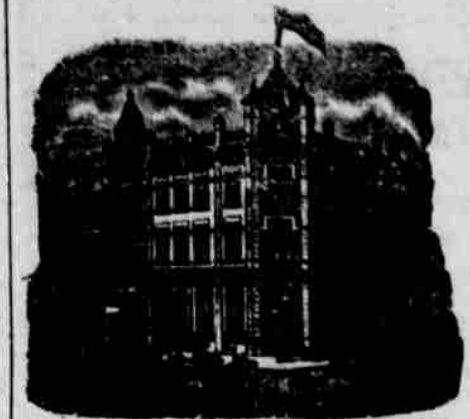

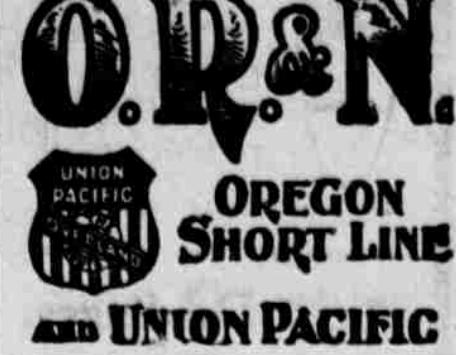
