GENERAL NEWS.

The senate confirmed the nomination of H. Clay Evans to be consul-general at London.

Former United States Senator William N. Roach, of North Dakota, is so ill at his home in New York city that there is but little hope of his recovery. He is suffering from a tumor.

Pat Crowe has been found and interviewed by an Omaha paper. He recently visited Omaha. He declared he had nothing whatever to do with the kidnapping of the Cudahy boy.

The senate passed a bill introduced by Senator Fairbanks appropriating \$100,000 for the purchase of supplies for the relief of the sufferers by the disaster in the island of Martinique.

The hotly contested suit of Mrs. Piggott against her niece for damages for the alienation of her husband's affections was brought to a close at Denver the jury returning a verdict in favor of the wife for \$50,000.

Mrs. Catherine Soffel, who released the Biddle brothers from the Allegheny county jail in January, was sentenced at Pittsburgh, Pa., to two years' imprisonment in the penitentiary for aiding and abetting the escape of prisoners.

The president has commuted to life sentence the sentence of death imposed by military court-martial in the case of Joseph F. Kean, private of the Twelfth infantry, who was convicted of killing Sergeant Charles F. Fleming, of the same regiment, in the Philippines in June last.

The state department having been advised that Margaret Taylor, the child kidnapped by her aunt, Clara Taylor, is suffering from neglect at Bordighera, Italy, owing to the inability of her aunt to care for her, has cabled United States Consul Pearson at Genoa to have her taken in charge by United States Consular Agent Ameglio at San Remo.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

The republican state central committee of Washington has agreed on September 10 as the date for the state convention, which will be held at Tacoma.

Ulysses S. Chartier, aged 33 years, committed suicide at Boise City. He took strychnine. Before he killed himself he made a deed transferring to his wife \$7000 worth of property.

The encampment of the Oregon National Guard this year will be in Hackerman's grove, adjoining Albany, from July 17 to 24, inclusive. Twenty-two companies in all, including hospital corps and troops, will go there, about 1400 men.

A wayne Osburn of Eugene, who ranks high in the class just graduated from the Annapolis naval academy, has, at the request of Representative Tongue, been assigned to duty on the battleship Oregon, reporting May 20. He will have two years active sea service before receiving his commission.

Butte has produced a girl named Mary McLane, who has written a book called "The Story of Mary McLane," in which she recounts her own feelings and views of things in general. Among other things she admits she is a genius. Critics say she is a degenerate, and others think for writing such ideas she should be spanked. At any rate the book has had a big sale.

NO MORE FREE LAND

DIFFICULT TO PASS BILLS REGARDING INDIAN LANDS.

In Almost All Instances Now Congressmen Provide for a Purchase Price to be Paid, the Returns to Go to the Red Man.

It is going to be difficult to secure the passage of the bills now pending before congress providing for opening to settlement, portions of the several Indian reservations of the west, unless the friends of these measures will consent to the insertion in the bill of a provision requiring that settlers taking up the ceded lands are to repay the government the price per acre to be paid to the Indians. There are ten or twelve bills of this character involving large amounts of land and calling for a considerable appropriation in the aggregate. Among them is the bill for opening the Crow reservation, Montana, and others in the several western states.

When a bill was under consideration in the senate the other day to open the unceded portion of the Rosebud reservation, in South Dakota, Senator Platt of Connecticut expressed a decided opposition to the bill, unless it was amended to require the settlers to pay the purchase price of the land. Other senators contended that after the passage of the free homes bill a few years ago it would be unfair to insert such a provision in this or any similar bill, but the Connecticut senator remained firm.

He said the government would not think of going into an eastern state and purchasing land from farmers, with the view of turning around and throwing it open to homestead settlement. Nor would the government undertake to buy land from settlers whose holdings adjoin Indian reservations and turn about and offer that land to settlers free of cost. He said there was no reason for buying Indian land at from \$1.50 to \$2.50 and even \$3 an acre, and allowing it to be taken up by homesteaders without cost. Such a policy, he contended, would involve the government in great expenditure, probably \$50,000,000 or more in the end, and he did not believe such an outlay was warranted or justified.

Senator Platt further intimated that there was more or less misinformation given out concerning Indian lands to be thrown open to settlement. He had noticed in the past that before the bills ratifying treaties with the Indians were passed, the lands were reported to be worth not over \$1.50 an acre, but as soon as the appropriation had been made and the lands opened, he found that the price uniformly showed a marked advance, oftentimes running as high as \$30 or \$40 an acre. He believes that if the lands are actually worth this price in the open market settlers can easily afford to repay the government the small price that is paid to the Indians to secure their relinquishment.

Another contention, and one which meets with general approval, is that hereafter all Indian lands to be thrown open to entry should be handled in the same manner as were the lands of the Kiowas, Comanches and Apaches in Oklahoma last summer. He says the old method of a rush always led to unlimited fraud and litigation whereas the lottery method last tried has proven an entire success, and has clearly established without question the ownership of every acre of land opened. He asserts that hereafter the drawing system shall prevail, and that no more rushes will be permitted.

But perhaps the most interesting statement made by Senator Platt was the following argument for demanding a repayment for lands entered:

"We have passed here an irrigation bill," said he, "and passed it unanimously in the senate. Its friends—and I think we are all its friends—desire that it shall prevail in the other house; but whether it does or not at this session of congress it is apparent that in the near future the government is to take the money derived from the sale of public lands and apply it to irrigation purposes. But the government lands from which money can be derived to be applied to irrigation purposes are pretty much gone. It is the opening of those Indian reservations upon which our irrigation friends must rest for their hope that they will acquire any large money from the government lands for irrigation purposes.

"If we make the settlers reimburse the government for what it has paid the Indians for their lands, what is the result? The government is going to get back the money to be sure, but it is going to take it immediately and hand it over for the purpose of irrigation. I think this view of the subject should recommend itself to those senators who wish to commence and to extend the irrigation of the arid lands. I think the necessity of enriching those arid lands by irrigation is just as great, to say the least, as the necessity of opening lands not needed to be irrigated to free settlement."
