PORTLAND'S SHOW

BUSINESS MEN OF PORTLAND TO VISIT PENDLETON.

Mayor Rowe Will Head the Delegation to Confer With the Business Men and Property Owners of Pendleton.

Portland, May 12.—J. N. Long, chairman of the advisory committee, Mayor Rowe, prominent in the management of the Lewis and Clark centennial, and other leading citizens of Portland, will be in Pendleton on Wednesday evening to consult with Pendleton business men regarding the affairs of the big exposition. They are now engaged in the work of placing the fair upon a sound financial basis, and will ask Pendleton to assist in the work.

Mr. Long has devoted much time and excellent talents to this work of preparation. He was asked for the East Oregonian what he thinks of the prospects for the exposition, and replied:

"I believe that the people of the state are going to support Portland in this enterprise. I know that towns already visited have done well, and am confident that others will follow the excellent lead that has been made. It is imperative that Portland have assistance from all towns, and I am free to say that we look to Pendleton to render some substantial aid. I am not giving you this as a 'jolly' for your people, but in the knowledge that Pendleton has always exhibited commendable enterprise in the past, we are sure we will not be disappointed in this case."

Portland Was Generous.

"In the first place, Portland has taken the work in hand with vigor, and has secured subscriptions that will be a liberal start towards the funds that will be needed. Unless Portland had done this, we could not in all conscience have gone to other cities of the state to present the case. However, Portland has, as I believe we may claim, acquitted itself creditably, and therefore we go elsewhere to seek assistance."

"I am satisfied that we are going to have a fair that will be a credit to the state and to the Northwest. In the East interest is aroused, and on the coast we have had assurances of support that warrant us in predicting success. All of the coast states are doing what they might have been expected to do, and are showing a spirit of co-operation that adds enthusiasm to determination on the part of the persons who have the work of preparation in hand. This work was by no means small. It involves the rendering of services by men who have private business interests to attend to, and it means some sacrifice on their part."

Some of the Benefits.

"I am not exaggerating when I say that the effects are already felt throughout Oregon. And, while Portland reaps her full share of the benefits, it is true also that all of Oregon will have its share. Immigration and work of development started are but two features of the forward movement that has begun and that will force Oregon to the front during the coming few years. Oregon has never been known in the east, as compared with the liberal advertising other coast states have received. This state has resources that will in time make it as great as any other. Yet these resources have not been exploited and are unknown throughout the country."

"The state must inaugurate a more active policy than has ruled in the past, and this policy will be inaugurated largely through the Lewis and Clark centennial exposition, for which we are now working and for which we hope all the business men of Oregon will soon be actively at work. I hope that the people of Pendleton will give general heed to the meeting that is to be held on Wednesday, and your people will be in a frame of mind to encourage us in the matter of finances."

Portland Interested.

I find that Portland people are intensely interested in the coming fair. They are more generally interested in this than in any other movement that has been started during the past, in so far as my knowledge of Oregon goes. They will exhibit enterprise such as has never before been seen here. They will endeavor to make the fair a success, and I believe that they will do so. Even during the excitement of a political campaign, when men are talking candidates and politics, and are absorbed apparently in that theme, they talk Lewis and Clark centennial, and they are backing their talk with substantial donation of services and money. Those who have to do with the details of the preparations assure me that they are encouraged in every respect, and that they are meeting with surprises every day in form of assistance that comes from sources unexpected."
