ELECTION FIGURES.

The Vote in Oregon in the Election in June 1900.

There is no means of knowing what the voting population of Oregon is at present for the reason that there has been a great influx of strangers and homeseekers since the election two years ago. As for the comparative strength of the republican, democratic and prohibition parties in this state, by counties, the best indication is given by the vote cast for justice of the supreme court at the election in 1900. Bright, Green and Wolverton were the nominees respectively of the prohibitionist, democratic and republican parties. The vote of each was considered at the time as strictly a party vote. The result of the election in each county was as follows:
